Had Its Period of Adversity.

For many years after the death of Dr. Clarke, under Superintendents Gardner and McCollum, the hospital had a precarious existence, as times were bad, and funds were low. In 1862 f10,000 were borrowed to pay off the debts. The hospital continued, however, until 1868, when, owing to lack of funds, the trustees closed it on Aug. I of that year. It remained closed for one year, when it reopened after the local legislature had carefully considered its affairs and thoroly reorganized its directorate. In 1875, thru the generosity of the late Mr. Erlandson of Port Hope and Mr. Gentle of Montreal, the sum of \$16,000 was spent on a system of heating the institution by steam and in effecting other necesary changes. In 1877, thru the liberality of Messrs. Cawthra. Gooderham and Worts, in donating a large sum, the western division of the main body was served these many years. All the prom-Messrs. Cawthra, Gooderham and Worts, in donating a large sum, the western division of the main body was erected. This portion was considerably enlarged in 1885 by an important extension to the west wing. In 1878 the various hospital charities of the city were amalgamated under one management and the Burnside Lying-in Hospital and the Andrew Mercer Eye and Ear Infirmary were erected on the hospital grounds as part of the Genand Ear Infirmary were erected on the hospital grounds as part of the General Hospital of the city. In 1882 the building known as the pavilion was erected from funds donated by the late Senator Macdonald and the late William Goodarham.
