## The Late Mrs. McCarthy.

The funeral took place yesterday at St. Thomas of the late Mrs. Jas. McCarthy who died recently in Detroit.

The funeral was held from the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. S. B. Pocock, Wellington street, to the Church of the Holy Angels. Rev. Father West conducted the services. The pall-bearers were Messrs. T. Farrell, F. Moore, T. H. Price, T. McManus and C. W. Regan. Amongst those present from a distance were relatives from London and Detroit.

Died at Dorchester.

The death took place early yesterday at Dorchester of Mr. James E. Jolly, formerly a resident of this city.

The late Mr. Jolly was born at Harrietsville in April, 1868. For many years he was engaged as a telegraph operator in different parts of Canada and the United States, but owing to losing the power of his legs, he was compelled to give up that kind of work. He is survived by his mother, two sisters and three brothers. Mr. Jolly was well known as a writer of no mean order, and frequently contributed articles to newspapers.

## Advertiser Correspondence

The Pay of Postmasters.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

With reference to the dispatch from Ottawa, which was in your paper of the 4th inst., relating to the increase which the Postmaster-General has been pleased to grant the postmasters, I would like to call attention in the columns of your paper, to an error in the dispatch which may cause a wrong impression in the minds of the public.

The clause referred to is this: "On the first \$800 revenue the postmaster now gets 40 per cent, whereas for the past four years we have been getting 44 per cent on that quantity of revenue. This error, apparently slight, however, means that the present increase amounts to only 13 7-11 per cent of the present salary, instead of 25 per cent, which the dispatch would lead one to believe."

It is true, that the announced rate of 50 per cent of the first \$800 revenue is 25 per cent better than five years ago, when the rate was 40 per cent, but that 40 per cent was fixed at confederation. Think of it! Sixty years ago, when rents and living were low compared to the present struggle for existence, and the purchasing power of \$1 equaled that of twice the amount now. One postmaster at the recent convention in Toronto stated that he and his two assistants were receiving an amount equal to 9 1/2 cents per working hour. Is that fair remuneration for being on duty from 6 a.m. until 10 p.m., as is frequently necessary? And this rate of pay per hour is not far from the average received by rural postmasters in Canada.

Moreover the dispatch does not indicate any increase in the scale of rental allowed, where the Government does not own the office. This is perhaps a more pressing need in the west, where the \$40 allowed per annum as rental, where the revenue is between \$700 and \$800, is only a fraction of what must often be paid in those growing villages and towns for almost any kind of building. Nor was any allowance mentioned for fuel, light and many of the things which the postmasters have to supply. Many people have the idea that the Government supplies these for the offices and possibly enough for the postmaster's household besides, as railways do for their agents; but it's the other way about, and it makes a considerable hole in the postmaster's bank account if there are any fortunate enough to possess such a desirable attachment.

We are thankful for the increase as announced in the dispatch, but do not, by any means, consider that full justice has been done us; nor do we believe that the public, understanding the facts, will consider us either.

## Spring Water and Filtered Water.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

We are reading so much in the Free Press about river water filtered, and if we would believe it, the only thing we can do is to put in a filtration plant, take the water from the north branch of the River Thames.

What is this water? It is drainage from thousands of farm barnyards and surface drainage from bogs and swamp lands, and in summer very much polluted and unfit for use.

If the Free Press and the doctors who favor filtration carry the scheme it will mean that our hospitals will have to be enlarged, for nothing, as we know, is as injurious to health as impure water.

Speaking from experience, I have used filtered water for eight years and would say I found it far from pure, and have no desire to use it again. Why should we think of abandoning the Komoka scheme? What is this water? Principally spring water, filtered by nature through beds of pure gravel and sand. We are told the supply is from three to four million gallons per day, which estimate I know to be very low, because having done a great deal of drainage work in the Kilworth and Komoka district, I am in a position to know, and am fully satisfied that from five to ten million gallons per day of the very best and purest water in our country
