## CZAR NICHOLAS DISMISSES PARLIAMENT: RUSSIA STEPS BACK TO THE OLD ORDER MEMBERS DEFIANT GATHER IN FINLAND

Emperor Packs St. Petersburg With Troops, Declares It Under Martial Law and Dissolves Duma---Wholesale Arrests Made---Autocracy Once More Supreme.

## Premier Goremykin Out and Followed by Stolypin.

St. Petersburg, July 22. - Russia's experiment in parliamentary government came to an ignominous end tonight with the promulgation of two imperial ukases, the first dissolving the present Parliament and providing for the convocation of its sucon March 5, 1907, more than six months hence, and the second proclaiming the capital of Russia and the surrounding provinces to be in a state of extraordinary security, which is only infinitesimally different from full martial law. This measure of safety is to provide for the outbursts which undoubtedly will be pro-Voked by this daring measure.

Manile, July 23.-A detachment of constabulary, Lieut, Williams commanding, encountered a band of 600 Pulajanes near Buraen on the Island of Leyete yesterday (Sunday) morning. Lieut. Worswick, twelve privates and Civilian Scout McBride were killed.

The constabulary were driven back. The Pulajanes secured 14 rifles and two revolvers. The bodies of Worswick, McBride and ten privates were recovered. Reinforcements of constabulary have been sent to the nearest station.
