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## Agitation in France

Growing Out of the Dreyfus Affair

Stormy Meeting of the Deputies-The Cabinet Sustained-Rioting at the Eiffel Tower

Paris, Jan. 18.-There was great excitement in the Chamber of Deputies, which opened at 10 o'clock, and which was a discussion of the semi-official note, in which the government declared that it would not reopen the Dreyfus case.

The premier, M. Meunier, in refusing to discuss the matter, declared that if the chamber voted its immediate disavowal of the cabinet would resign.

The house then, by a vote of 410 to 242, adopted a motion shelving the discussion.

Several small anti-Dreyfus demonstrations took place in various parts of the city, but were quickly dispersed.

The neighborhood was invaded by the police, and the rapidly growing crowd increased the excitement. At 9 o'clock, on the opening of the meeting, the hall was crowded by a mass of excited people, shouting, "Vive la République!"

The members of the anti-Dreyfus committee displayed banners, bearing the inscription "Death to the Jew!" and other inscriptions. It was seen that the 5000 present consisted largely of anarchists and of others bent on opposing the students.

On M. Guérin, the president, proposing that the hon. secretary be elected, the hall was invaded by the police, and a great uproar ensued.

The anarchists tried to force the French the banners from the anti-Dreyfusists. Then the police took place, and the hall was invaded by the police.

M. Thebaud delivered an address, denouncing the Jews and urging the assembly to support the government.

FRENCH TRADE RETURNS

Paris, Jan. 18.-The official returns just issued shows the imports for 1897 have been 4,091,156,000 francs, as compared with 3,738,573,000 in 1896. The exports for 1897 were 3,675,613,000 francs, compared with 3,409,920,000 francs during the previous year.

BREDAID RIOTS

Ancona, Italy, Jan. 18.-There have been bread riots here, arising from a demonstration of women organized by the Socialists, and proceeded to the town hall to beg a reduction in the price of bread. The mayor promised the measures, but the men then joined the demonstration and stoned several shops. In the melee that ensued several were hurt. Several arrests were made.

THE SEALING BROTHER

London, Jan. 18.-Great Britain has again declined to reopen the sealing question. It seems that her previous refusal gave its reason that while investigations were pending between the United States and Canada, Great Britain could not reopen the matter. To this the United States replied that no negotiations were pending, and renewed the request, but the foreign office sends its reply that the government does not see its way to reopen the question. The United States ambassador, Col. John Hey and Mr. Spencer, his private secretary, left London today on their way to Egypt.

COMPLAINT AGAINST ZOLA

Paris, Jan. 18.-The minister of war, Gen. Billot, has lodged with the minister of justice, M. Darlan, a formal complaint against M. Zola, the manager of the Aurore. The complaint will be forwarded to the public prosecutor. The Aurore, on Jan. 12, published an open letter from Emile Zola to President Faure, pointing out the mistakes of the government in the court martial of Major Count Esterhazy, and formally accusing the minister of war, Gen. Billot, of having committed a crime.

PLEASES ALL PARTIES

London, Jan. 18.-The country generally is greatly pleased by the announcement made by the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks Beach, at Swansea last night, in which he echoed the previous declarations of the first lord of the treasury, Hon. A. J. Balfour, at Manchester, on the occasion of the government's position, and added that the ministers were determined, even at the cost of war, to maintain the policy of peace.
