

### UNITED STATES TO MARSHAL RESOURCES AGAINST SUB EVIL

Cabinet Will Concentrate on No Sign of Dropsy and Kidney Feeding Allies.

WASHINGTON, April 27.-Evidence of growing success for the ruthless man submarine blockade has forced the problem of supplying the Entente quickly with food and other necessities sharply into the forefront of the American Government's war program. can Government's war program.

Aroused by information brought to this country by the British and French war missions, President Wilson and his cabinet gravely set about today to launch with its full force as speedily as possible the campaign to break down the blockade, planned by the Administration as the nation's first physical stroke against Germany






