The weather continues unfavorable for offensive operations, but despite heavy rains, the airmen are working in great numbers. The enemy is much rampered in his withdrawal, as the Allies are moving artiflery across the muddy and swampy country. The possibilities seem exceedingly good.

Everything depends on the success of Haig's operations north and south of the Scarpe, where the Hindenburg line is most vulnerable. The Somme offers a strong natural defence for the enemy and it is probable that he has constructed a good line behind it during the last week, but it will not serve him long if Haig drives far into his defences between Bapaume and Monchy.

That the Allies will recover all the territory they lost in March seems not too much to expect in the early future. Whether they can get behind the Hindenburg line and force a collapse of the whole German defensive system in the west will be known shortly.

General von Ardinne makes a rather frank admission in the Berliner Tageblatt, when he says that Ludendorff was guilty of underestimating the strength of Foch's reserves. He says the Germans thought that they had dealt the British and French such heavy blows that they could not recover during the present campaign, and that Berlin semi-official reports fostered this view. Will Soon Be Revealed.

"It was based, however, on error," he says, "and it is good for us to admit as much. Acting on the principle of sparing precious German blood, our command decided to shorten the front. When, therefore, at home the loss of ground makes a particularly painful impression, anxiety should disappear in the realization that the measures which have been taken do not owe their origin to feeling of weakness, but are due to cool and deliberate calculation."

MILLION HUNS SLAIN IN WAR

Figures Given Out After Careful Study of Tables.

THOUSANDS CAPTURED

British Took Over 21,000 Germans Between August 21 and 26.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—It is estimated by experts here that the German losses in killed alone now reach a total of more than 2,000,-000, and probably approach 3,000,-000. These figues were given out after a study of tables of German and Allied losses, which have been published.

and Allied losses, which have been published.

The total captures by the Allies on the western front since July 18 now approach 120,000 prisoners and 2,000 guns. The British captured more than 21,000 prisoners between August 21 and 26, while the British total losses in the same period, including all killed, wounded and missing, were only slightly in excess of that figure. A considerable proportion of the British casualties are in the slightly wounded class.

The total captures by the British since August 8 exceed 47,000 officers and men, and the captured guns number nearly 600.

Foe Must Shorten Front.

British military observers say it is now clear that the Germans intend to retire to a shorter line on the western front, where they can obtain better defensive positions against the constantly repeated Entente Allied blows, and so that the enemy can economize his forces which has become an urgent man power.

Moreover, the moral effect of any kind of retirement has been proved to be very great on the German people and armies, and the enemy's present intention is apparently to make a stand on some line well west of the Hindenburg line, if possible.

The Germans are watching a very favorable line along the Ailette, Oise, Somme and Tortille, but it remains to be seen whether they will be permitted to make a stand there, or even carry out a retirement "according to plans," to this line without it being broken somewhere else by the eager Allied forces.

The most important obstacle to the German scheme at present is the recent British advance on both sides of the Scarpe, which is a serious flanking threat to the whole Hindenburg position. The British are almost in contact with the famous Drocourt-Queant "switch" running from Queant to Lille.
