and add to the pot along with the prowned onlons. Stir these vegetables for a minute or two, and then add two quarts of cold water—eight breakfast


The contents of the pot are allowed to boil until the rabbit it quite tender, and this process may take anything from an hour and a half to two hours. When they have become tender the pieces of rabbit are removed, cut into neat squares and put on one side. The bones are returned to the soup and boiled for another hour.

After the soup has been strained and the vegetables rubbed through a sieve the former is returned to the pot. Two tablespoonfuls of flour are next browned in a roasting tin in the oven. The browned flour is moistened with a little cold water, there being afterward added a dessertspoonful of salt and a good shake of pepper. This thickening is stirred into the soup and the squares of rabbit added. Next boil for 10 minutes, when the soup will be ready.
