BULGARIA, COSTA RICA, FINLAND
AND LUXEMBURG ARE ADMITTED
TO THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

French and Australian Delegates Decline To Cast Ballots On Bulgaria's Entrance—Viviani Declares Case Bears Too Much Resemblance To German Question—Thirty-Five Vote in Favor of New Members—Canadian Delegates Vote in Favor of Admitting All Four Nations.

Geneva, Dec. 16.—Canada's delegates took a prominent part in today's session of the assembly of the League of Nations, at which four new nations, Bulgaria, Costa Rica, Finland and Luxembourg, were admitted to membership. The Canadian delegates voted for the admission of all four, but Australia and France abstained from voting when the admission of Bulgaria was before the assembly.

1,000,000 MEN OUT OF WORK IN G.T. BRITAIN; SITUATION IS GRAVE

COMMUNISTS FAIL TO SEIZE POWER IN CZECHO-SLOVAKIA
Radical Leaders Are Imprisoned.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Attempts which have been made by communists in Czechoslovakia to overthrow the Government and seize power in that nation have failed entirely, according to the latest dispatches to the French foreign office.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS WILLING TO CONTRIBUTE ONE-THIRD NEEDED FOR RELIEF FOR THE UNEMPLOYED
Policy Outlined Is Based On Co-operation of Municipal and Provincial Authorities—Measures of Relief Must Be Instituted by Municipalities—Certificates Demanded by Department—Senator Robertson Declares Work and Not Money Is Plan Proposed by Administration.

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—Canadian Press.—The unemployment policy of the Dominion Government was announced today. The gist of the announcement is this: Should emergency relief measures become necessary by reason of utterly unavoidable shortage of work the Federal Government will be willing to co-operate on the following basis:

"The organization for determining where relief must go and for distributing the same shall be provided by the municipal authorities, and in each case before relief is given, and as relief is continued, a certificate must be obtained from the Government employment service, showing that the applicant cannot find employment. The general system and details and the safeguards adopted must be approved by or on behalf of the Federal Government."
