FLOW OF MOLTEN METAL INJURES SEVERAL MEN

Bottom Drops Out of Huge Ladle - One May Die - Milkman Want Better Inspection.

HAMILTON, Aug. 31.-(Special.)—There was a serious accident at the east end plant of the Hamilton Steel & Iron Co. this afternoon...

One of the workmen, John Southern, 19 Sydney-street, was buried all over his body, and his life is despaired of.

Robert Connelly, 29 Burton-street, was also taken there, but the others were able to get to the hospital on street cars...

The three men less seriously burned were: Fred Voltermen, 52 West Canboro-street; John Beveridge, 273 North East-avenue...

The board of health at its meeting to-night had a rather unusual item before them which practically amounted to a request from the Milk Dealers' Association to increase their fee from \$1 to \$1.50 a year.

Burglars at St. Thomas. ST. THOMAS, Aug. 31.—The gent's furnishing store of G. E. Norman, Sheldon, was broken into by burglars early this morning and \$12 stolen from the till. While trying to break into Mr. Edy's general store, the latter fired several revolver shots at them.

SENTENCED TO 5 YEARS ON CHARGE OF BIGAMY

Nathaniel Self Gets Long Term From Magistrate Bartlett—Said to Have Four Wives.

WINDSOR, Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Nathaniel Self, alias George Ferguson, who deserted his wife and children in London and contracted another marriage with a woman named Lillian North, with whom he was living at a local hotel when arrested, was to-day sentenced to five years in Kingston, having previously pleaded guilty to a charge of bigamy.

The prisoner was the heaviest administered for some years on this charge, but Magistrate Bartlett found no extenuating circumstances for Self. He followed him to his cell, which was in Port Huron and Woodstock. His London wife and the North woman went to see him in the Sandwich Jail and both left with tears in their eyes.

There is no personal attraction about Self, and the authorities are at a loss to know how he possesses such a fascination for the feminine sex.

Want to Shorten Sentence. KINGSTON, Aug. 31.—(Special.)—An effort is being made by the friends of Charles Shaw, former street car conductor, to have his sentence of six months, to have him released. He has four months yet to serve.

JUMPS FROM TRAIN TO DEATH. Getting From Wrong Train. Buffalo Woman Throws Upon Her Head.

DUNNVILLE, Ont., Aug. 31.—Mrs. Frederick Blair of Buffalo was killed at Canfield Junction this morning. She had been visiting friends at Neiles' Corners, and was returning home with her husband. They got off the Port Dover train and by mistake got on the train for Hamilton instead of that for Buffalo. They discovered their mistake when the train was moving, and Mr. Blair jumped off. Mrs. Blair followed him, falling over the head on the platform, causing concussion of the brain.

Accused of Setting Fire to Home, Causing at Least Two Deaths. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 31.—John Sprous, charged with incendiarism, was brought here from Cherokee, N. C., where he had been arrested. He is accused of setting fire to the residence of Charles Cooper, near Cherokee, resulting in the death of two of the more conservative dressers who were in the house at the time. Two other children are in a serious condition. Cooper is so badly burned that his recovery is doubtful.

SEVEN WENT DEPORTATION. Apply at Parliament Buildings to Be Sent Back to Europe.

There were seven applicants for deportation at the parliament buildings yesterday. All had claims they considered good for government-paid passage back to Europe.

ONE KILLED, TWO INJURED BY A PREMATURE BLAST. CORNWALL, Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Alexander Adams, son of John Adams of Cornwall, Ont., arrived home to-day from Normington, Que., where he was badly injured in a premature dynamite explosion on Friday. His head and face is badly burned, and his eyes are closed, but it is believed that the sight is unimpaired.
