HAMILTON, May 12 .- (Special.)-The cemetery board this evening decided not to entertain the proposition made by the Hamilton Mausoleum Co to erect a mausoleum to accommodate 500 badies. The promoters explained that they proposed to erect the building, sell the crypts at once and then withdraw after establishing a fund for its perpetual care. The board intimated that if the company bought land adjoining the cemetery and went ahead with the project, the mard might take it over.
