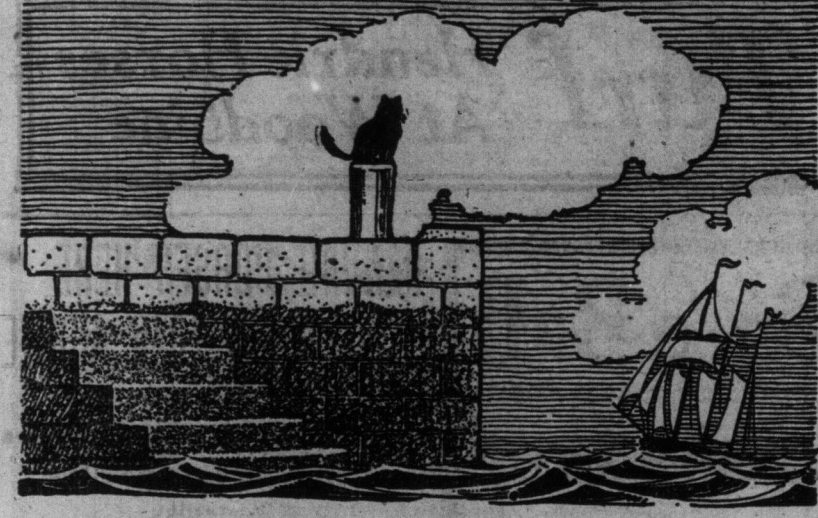

**BLUE BONNETS GOSSIP**

**HORSEMEN HAVE FAITH.**

MONTREAL, April 27.—Notwithstanding the shortened meeting on the Canadian circuit this year, the horsemen have not lost confidence and are coming north from Baltimore and the Kentucky tracks as soon as the meetings at those places are at an end, while a goodly number come north from the metropolitan tracks.

As regards the Montreal meeting, which is fixed to take place from June 4 to 11 inclusive, opening and closing on a Saturday, word has been received from Baltimore that the horsemen are well pleased with the plans of the Montreal Jockey Club. The idea of the extra value handicaps, and the steeplechase owners will be here strong, many of them planning to ship to Montreal direct. A race for the jumpers will be carried every day, and there will be one stake event for each.

Among those who are coming here are William and Wanda Girth, both of whom have large strings that are specially strong in two-year-old material.

T. E. Manly, who has not been in Montreal for a couple of years, will ship direct here from Baltimore.

James McLaughlin, Jr., who has had considerable success on the winter tracks, has stated his intention of coming to Montreal and of being represented in the stake events.

James Hewitt will have five good horses at Blue Bonnets, and W. A. Burtchell is bringing along four for Sam Louis.

R. J. Walden, who has one of the largest strings of racers in training, and who gives his horses their preparatory work on a private three-quarter-mile track on his farm at Middleburg, Md., is making preparations to take in the Canadian circuit. His stable, which includes several jumpers, is now racing at Pimlico.

Another steeplechase owner who will be represented in the Prince of Wales is Frank Kenny. J. P. Miles will also be here, and will be represented in the stakes.
