Matriculation to Be Combined With Departmental Examination.

For the benefit of candidates for the provincial examinations it is an-nounced that arrangements for comoming the departmental with the matriculation examinations have been completed. The universities and the minister of education have reached tons agreement after several conferences, and official notices are now going out to the schools. This year the normal school entrance and pass matriculation examinations held June will be uniform, as also will be the faculty entrance and honor matriculation examinations. . To this intimation, which was foreshadowed some time ago, are now added other announcements of equal importance to candidates. There will be held in September next examinations for normal and faculty entrance and matriculation similar to those held in June. Candidates who are unable to write in June, or who fail to pass then, may write in September. They thus have two chances in one year. The min-ister has decided to make certain concessions to candidates in departmental examinations: a candidate whose failexaminations: a candidate whose ran-ure at an examination is due solely to a failure on one paper, may com-plete his standing by writing on that one paper alone at subsequent exam-ination and obtaining 60 per cent. thereon. Those who have carried over one subject only from previous years will also be given the privilege of writing on that paper alone. Moreover, a candidate who, either in June or September next, obtains pass matriculation, partial or complete, in-cluding the eight obligatory subjects of the middle school, examination will be given a middle school certificate. The certificates of principals for practical work in science will not be exe-cuted this year.
