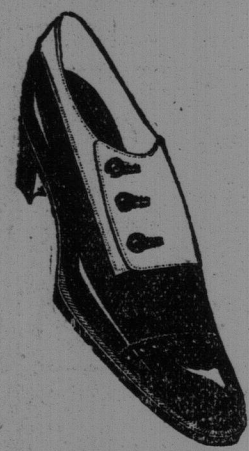

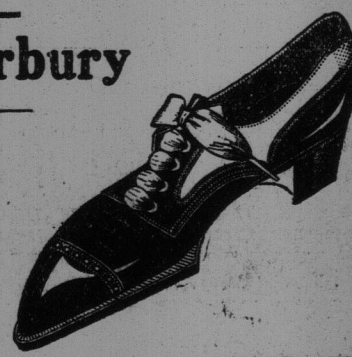

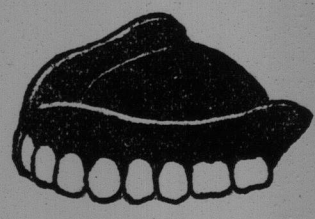

LONDON HOUSE ASKS DAMAGES

King Street Dry Goods Firm Wants Compensation for Goods Injured by Water.

The case of the London House, Wholesale vs. Whittaker is being heard in the equity court before Mr. Justice Barker this afternoon.

The plaintiff company claims further that there was a covenant between the landlord and themselves, providing that Mr. Whittaker keep the roof of the building in good and tenable repair.

Mr. Whittaker, on the other hand, while admitting that such an agreement was made, claims that he complied with the conditions embodied in it and if the water pipe was clogged, he got no word of it, and he was in no way responsible for the damage.

Hanington, Teed and Hanington are acting for the plaintiff company, E. T. C. Knowles for Mr. Whittaker, and L. A. Curry, K. C., is counsel.

EQUITY COURT

The case of the Canadian Pacific Railway vs. Penell Nason, Alexander Steen and William Steen was continued in the equity court before Mr. Justice Barker this morning.

Further affidavits were read on behalf of the defendant Penell Nason, Weldon & McLean on behalf of the C. P. R. road.

The affidavit of William Damery, and Hugh H. McLean, solicitor of the C. P. R. in support of the injunction order. The question of leave to avoid the bill of complaint of the C. P. R. by filing the affidavits of Messrs. Downie and McLean, was also taken up and his honor intimated that he would render his decision on Friday morning next.

STARR TROPHY WINNERS HOME

Moncton Victorias Returned from Halifax Early This Morning.

MONCTON, March 20.—(Special)—The Victoria hockey team returned last night from Halifax. The train was delayed three hours by the engine blowing out a cylinder head at Springhill, but a large number of people remained up till after one o'clock this morning to welcome the Starr trophy winners.

The Victorias were given a warm welcome. Mayor White made a short speech and the members of the team were honored upon alighting from the train.

WILSON HAD CLOSE CALL

Man Who Fell from Dorchester Street Bridge Escaped With Few Scratches.

A man named Wilson had a very narrow escape this morning from being seriously injured, but fortunately escaped with a few scratches about the head.

Wilson, who had been finishing, attempted to walk across the foot bridge at the foot of Dorchester street, and when at the top of it lost his balance and fell into the I. C. B. yard below, a distance of about 25 or 30 feet.

Men employed in the yard rushed to his assistance and carried him to the barn of the Sussex Milk and Cream Co. Dr. D. E. Berryman was summoned, and after a thorough examination stated that Wilson was injured.

Sergeant Baxter was subsequently dispatched from central station, but Wilson was taken to his home on Crown street.

It is a miraculous thing that he was unhurt, as not many years ago a man named Collins was killed by falling from the same bridge.

WANTS TELEPHONE TO GRAND MANAN

W. A. Fraser, president of the Grand Manan Telephone Company, Ltd., and E. D. Dalzell, manager and secretary of the company, were in the city yesterday to interview the board of trade and others and secure support for a project to establish telephonic communication between the island of Grand Manan and the mainland.

Mr. Dalzell said that the reason they came here was because of the business done between here and Grand Manan. They are supported by the Liberal Club of Grand Manan, the St. Stephen Liberal Club and the board of trade and representative men in Charlotte county. They interviewed J. H. McRobbie yesterday and will submit their request to the board of trade.

INTERESTING LEGAL POINT

The case of the Canadian Pacific Railway vs. Penell Nason, Alexander Steen and William Steen, came up in the equity court yesterday. A motion was made on behalf of the defendant Nason to have an injunction order obtained by the plaintiffs against the defendants, dissolved, on the ground that material facts were not presented to the court and the bill and affidavit upon which the order had been issued were manifestly.

The matter is one of considerable importance, involving a nice question of international law as yet untried in this country. The point at issue is, will the New Brunswick courts recognize the action of Maine courts in trustee wages earned in this province and due and payable here to a resident of the province who is also a British subject, the trustee yet having been issued at the instance of British subjects doing business in New Brunswick.

The wages in question had contracted a debt here considerably less than the amount of wages due, the wage earner having been served in this province and not having appeared in the Maine court nor consented to appear.

The affidavit of the defendant Nason was read; also an affidavit from his solicitor L. P. D. Tilley and court adjourned till this morning. Weldon & McLean represented the C. P. R.; M. G. Teed, K. C. and Tilley & McInerney represented the defendant, Nason, and J. King Kelly appeared for J. B. M. Baxter, solicitor for Steen Bros.

POLICE REPORTS

Seven prisoners were disposed of at this morning's session of the police court. Drunkenness and profanity were the only offences and two of the group paid their fines.

Joseph Lunney charged with drunkenness, forfeited a deposit of \$8. A charge of 23 cents also appears on the sheet against him.

James McGinley, William Page, Daniel Crowley and James Scott were fined \$4 or ten days each, also for drunkenness.

James McCloskey was fined \$8 or thirty days on a similar charge.

John Mayberry an Australian, was fined \$8 or thirty days for being drunk and using profane and obscene language on Mill street. Mayberry and Crowley paid their fines.

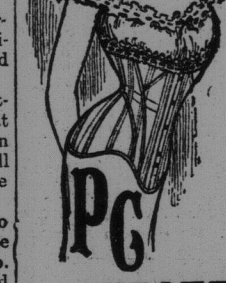
