May it please Your Excellency,

The Undersigned Members of a Committee lately appointed at a numerous and respectable Meeting of the Merchants and principal Inhabitants of St. Andrews and its vicinity, to take into consideration the expediency of constructing a Rail way from this portion of His Majesty's North American Colonies to Quebec in Lower Canada, as will more fully appear by the accompanying Resolutions; beg leave most respectfully to suggest for Your Excellency's approval, the utility and importance of such an undertaking. In following up the unanimously expressed opinion of the well informed portion of this community of the reciprocal and certain advantages that must accrue to the inhabitants of New-Brunswick and the Canadas, by facilitating the transportation of commodities of British, Colonial, and Foreign origin, and opening up a high way for the immediate developement of the vast and inexhaustible internal resources of this Country; and knowing your Excellency's devotion to the welfare of this Province particularly, and to the encouragement of enterprise generally, are induced respectfully but earnestly to solicit that your Excellency will be pleased to take the premises into consideration and grant such counternance and encouragement to the contemplated important undertaking, as your Excellency may seem meet,—and as in duty bound will ever pray.
