The amount of accounts rendered at this Court is £174 14s, 2d, of this £124 4s, 2d, is recommended to be paid, which the revenue arising from the license money and the County grass this year will more than meet. A petition has been laid before the Jury from Charles Bulyca and others, for an allowance for loss on hay; they would recommend that no action be taken on it.

The accounts rendered by the Overseers of the Poor are for the most part unintelligible.
