I DON'T FEEL LIKE CHAMPION SAYS LEONARD

New York, May 30.—"The funny part
of it is I don't feel like a champion. I
feel just exactly like Benny Leonard,
who was begging for a change to knock
Freddie Welsh out and bring the world's
lightweight championship back to Am-
erica."

"That's how Benny Leonard expressed
himself today as he decried his
feelings after he had annexed Welsh's
lightweight crown.
"I went home feeling kind of funny
and happy, and when I awakened yester-
day morning I yelled to mama to
give me some dope or something, be-
cause I didn't feel a bit different. You
know when a fellow's after something
right hard and won't rest until he gets
it, he sorta feels he should feel like a dif-
ferent man when he finally lands it. But
it isn't that way at all. I'm just plain
Benny Leonard and glad of it."

"When I got home from the fight these
were hundreds of people in front of the
house. They yelled and yelled until I
stuck my head out of the window. They
wanted me to make a speech, but I
couldn't say anything. I just held up
my hands, yelled: 'I love yez all,' and
ran back."
Leonard was asked what he thinks of
Johnny Kilbane, the man who started
Welsh down the decline by whipping
him soundly just before Leonard won
the world's championship. "He's a grand
little fellow," Leonard replied, "but I
feel sure I'll stop him when we meet.
I don't care if it's six rounds or twenty.
I just have the feeling that I can do it."

New York, May 30.—Manager Gibson
states: "I have no immediate plans for
Benny, other than those made several
weeks ago for a bout in Philadelphia,
which will be held next Monday night.
This match is coming off as scheduled,
even though Benny was hoy champion
when the articles for it were signed."

REAPING THE WHIRLWIND

(Halifax Chronicle)
The Morning Chronicle has no sym-
pathy whatever with the outbreaks
which have occurred in Montreal and
Quebec. The agitators who took part
in them are to be condemned in the
most severe terms. No Canadian who
values the good name of his country or
who recognizes the duty incumbent upon
us all at this time, can have anything
but the severest condemnation for those
who are responsible for these thence-
less occurrences. At the same time, we are
inclined to believe with the Montreal
Gazette, a sane and moderate Conserva-
tive journal, that their seriousness may
be over-estimated, and that the leaders
who have organized these demonstra-
tions are not men of recognized weight.
Nor do we believe that they represent
the sober judgment of the people of
Quebec.

We cannot forget, however, that the
men who are loudest and most violent
in their harangues today are the men
who were associated with and cam-
paigning for Sir Robert Borden and his
party in the general election of 1911. In
that campaign the Nationalists whose
creed was "not a dollar, not a man, not
a ship in aid of Britain," were financed
by the Tory campaign managers, and
their literature was circulated through-
out French-speaking Canada, by the
Tory machine in Montreal. Sir Robert
Borden formed his "Ginby Alliance"
with Bourassa and his gang in 1911, and
profited by their support. He was re-
turned to power largely through their
efforts. He gave them three portfolios
in his cabinet. He sowed the wind in
1911 and he is reaping the whirlwind in
1917.

The doctrine which his allies preached
against the Canadian navy in 1911 is
the doctrine which they are seeking to
apply to the present situation. The re-
sponsibility for the deplorable situation
of today which only the most prudent
counsels can solve, rests upon the men
who played politics with a great nation-
al question in 1911, and are now reap-
ing the fruits of the most dastardly par-
tisan game in the history of Canada.
