CATTLE RECORD AT SAINT JOHN IS SURPASSED

In Three Months 14,480 Head Are Shipped From Here

MONTH OF MARCH IS BEGINNING WELL

Summer Service Continued Here This Year, Is Expectation

Cattle shipments through Saint John to the United Kingdom during the first three months of the winter port season this year have exceeded all recent records as 14,480 head were shipped during this period.

The total number of livestock shipped through the port during February was 4,402 head of cattle and 1,045 hogs. The highest month was December, when 5,417 head of cattle passed through the port.

SUMMER TIME ALSO

While by far the largest shipments of cattle through this port came during the winter season, as Montreal and Quebec are used chiefly during the summer, the Orinole Line for two years has been operating to this port during the summer months for cattle.

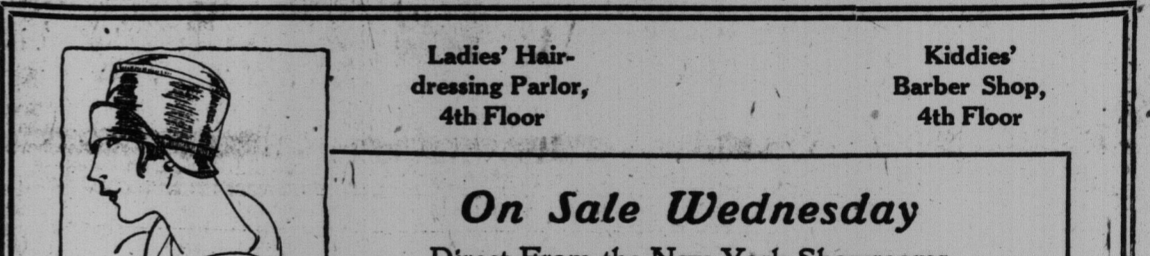
HAD GOOD TIME.
