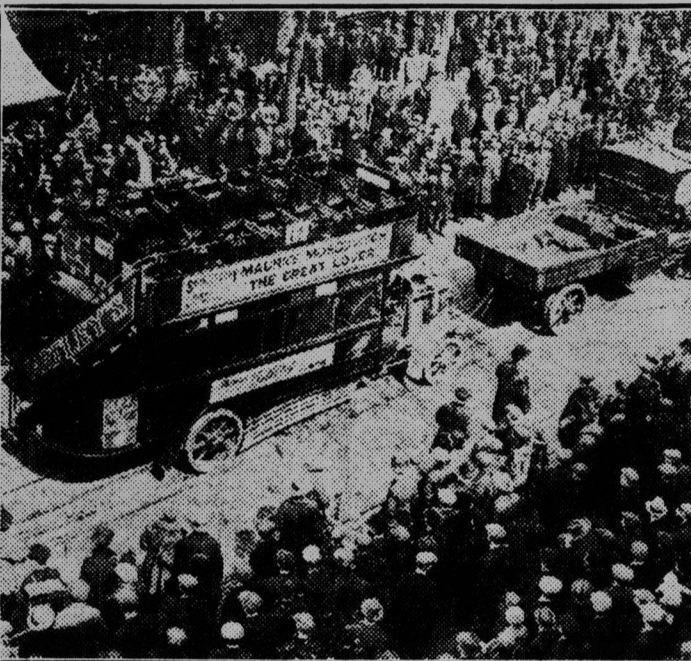
Newton Heights Mother Reports Soon After Quitting Home

YOUNG GIRLS MOLESTED BY UNKNOWN MEN

One Miss Seized, But She Escapes and Flees To Her Home

The men were of middle age and had apparently been drinking. They asked the girls to walk up Park street with them. Upon being refused, one of the men, who wore a grey hat and grey coat, grabbed one of the girls, who told the police later that she shook herself clear and ran down High street. The man followed her, but she reached her home on Dufferin street before he could catch her. From there she immediately notified the police. Although the officers were quickly on the scene and made a thorough search, no trace of the men could be found. The officers, however, have a good description of the pair.
