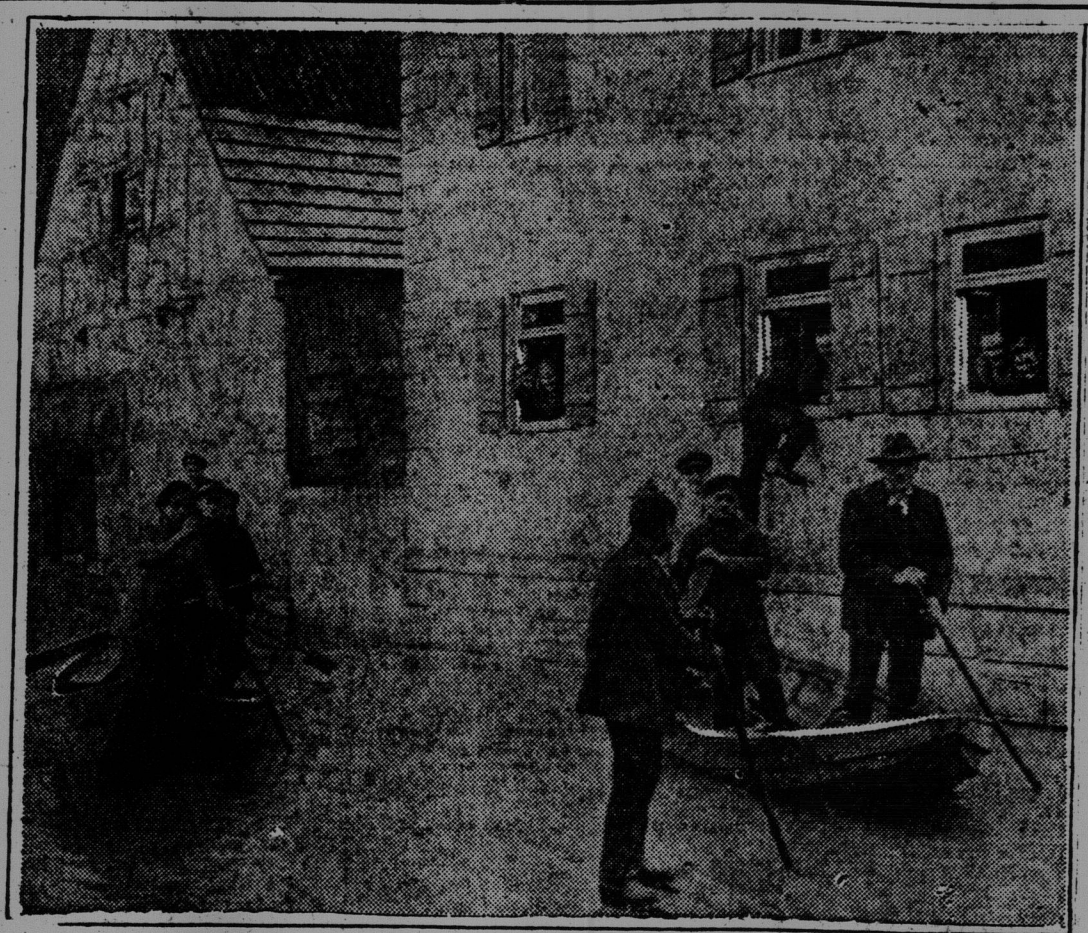

FRENCH FRANC DECLINES TO NEW LOW MARK

Slump Follows Bank's Notice of Circulation Increase

OUTLOOK BLACK

Pessimism Increased by Attack on Caillaux Plan in Chamber

PARIS, July 8.—After a slight recovery from Tuesday's slump, the French franc today sagged heavily to a new low record of 39.01 to the dollar on news that the Bank of France statement would show an increase in circulation of nearly a billion francs.

Pessimism was also increased in financial circles by the attack on the government yesterday in the Chamber of Deputies.

Criticism of Finance Minister Caillaux's plans for stabilization of the French exchange and for ratification of the debt accords, has resulted in the feeling that serious difficulties are now ahead of the government.

DEBT PACT ATTACKED

M. Franklin-Bouillon, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Chamber, yesterday attacked ratification of the United States debt settlement, a basic element of French interests.

Today four other announced interpellations remained to be heard, but prospects were that the debate will be completed and a vote reached before the end of the week.

REPORTS PERSIST

Most interest was shown in reports that persisted, despite denials, that Gilbert Parker, agent general for reparations collections, was en route to Antilles, to consult with Montagu Norman, head of the Bank of England, and Benjamin Strong, head of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, on the possibility with Dr. Schacht, of the German Reichsbank.

CANADA RESIGNS FROM FEDERATION

Football Association Makes Several Changes in Administration Matters
At the recent meeting held in Rome, members of the International Federation of Football Associations, the organization which governs the play of soccer in Europe and a few other countries, made some important changes in the rules and regulations. It is of noteworthy consideration that the rules governing the game were not touched. Only matters of administration came before the delegates.

The countries represented were Italy, Belgium, France, Spain, Czechoslovakia, Brazil, Argentina, Finland, Ireland, Poland, Norway, Chile, Germany, England, Holland, Hungary, Sweden, Denmark, Lithuania, Luxembourg and Portugal. In addition Ecuador and Bolivia were admitted to membership and the resignations of Canada and Northern Africa were accepted. The Canadian reported that they were so far removed from the headquarters of the organization that it did not appear feasible for them to continue as members, and Northern Africa reported that the international scope of the game, so far as it was concerned, was too limited to warrant further participation in the organization.

After considerable discussion it was voted that each country have just one vote in balloting on all issues that the organization is called upon to decide. In the past some of the countries such as England and France, had been sending five delegates to the annual meeting and each delegate cast a vote. In the future the number of delegates will not be limited but they will have to combine and turn in just one ballot.

It was also agreed that in the future the organization must hold at least two meetings a year. So much business had to be taken care of at the Rome meeting that the delegates found they had to adopt some means of making the handling of business matters more rapid.
