The new papers are: Il Fronte Interno, L'Epoca, Il Tempo, and L'Avvenire. Another daily Ragione (Reason) is also announced.

The eighteen newspapers vary from two to four pages in size, according to their prosperity and the government's limitations on the amount of pages that may be printed in any one week.

SALARIES FOR FOOD BOARD

Ottawa, Feb. 14—Appropriations for the new food board, headed by H. B. Thompson, provide for a salary schedule for the principal officials of \$20,000 in view of the fact that the board is established on a more or less permanent basis.

The government has now provided a salary for Mr. Thompson who came to Ottawa last autumn from J. W. Hanna's chief advisor and gave his services without remuneration. His salary will be \$7,000 per annum. The salaries of the chiefs of branches and other experts connected with the board will grade from \$5,000 down.


