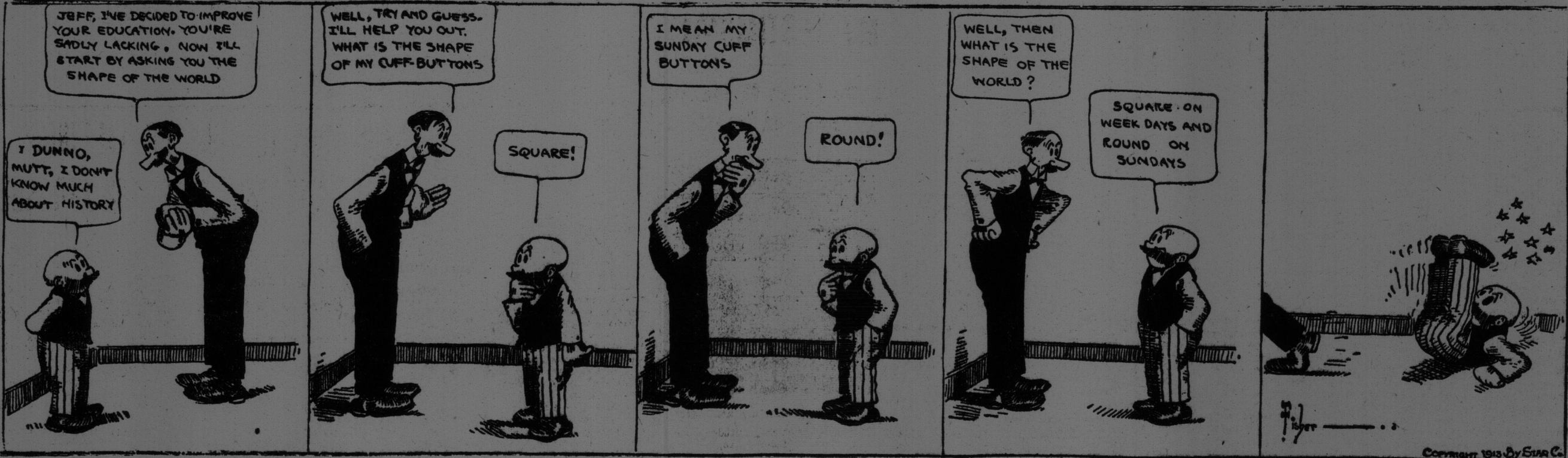

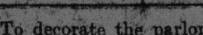
McCarty Has Best Claim on the Heavy Weight Title

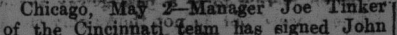
