BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Two hundred Barnardo children
have sailed for Canada.

Spain has recalled her ambassador
from the Vatican, and a rupture is
now deemed inevitable.

J. McD. Mowat of Kingston has
been appointed by the Dominion Gov-
ernment to accompany Hon. Mr. St.
Just on his tour of Canada.

O. Smith, a farmer living about four
miles from Comber, in the Township
of Rochester, dropped dead yesterday
while entering his home for dinner.

Erwin Wiler, who is accused of rob-
bing the Russo-Chinese Bank of se-
curities worth half a million dollars,
was arrested in New York last night.

The coroner's jury at Chicago em-
paneled to enquire into the death of
Ira G. Rawn, late president of the
Mono Railway, found that he died by
his own hand.

Capt. Donnelly has adjusted the loss
on behalf of the marine underwriters,
caused by the steamer Phoenix of the
George Hall Co., smashing the gates
of the Cornwall Canal last week.

The total loss was fixed at \$12,000.

Earl and Countess Grey were taken
on a tour of Georgian Bay Islands on
J. C. Eaton's yacht from Parry Sound.

Railway contractors in the west say
they will have employment for all
farmers and teams who may be idle
on account of the harvest failure.

While working on the Belleville
wharf last Saturday, Joseph Desbanc,
hurt his thumb with a rope. No no-
tice was taken of the slight wound.

Yestern, his arm and leg swelled
twice their size and his life is now
despaired of as a result of blood poi-
soning.

Ontario West Storm Sweep.
London, Ont., July 29.—A rain and
wind storm swept over London and
the district west of here yesterday
afternoon.

Last night on a telephone line west
of London was working, and the tele-
graph lines are in trouble as well.

Trees by dozens were blown down
about the city, and broken down
wires hung up some of the street rail-
way lines.

The top of a fir tree blew down on
top of a team of horses in a funeral
at Woodland cemetery, but the driver
was able to control them.

Lightning struck a house on the
Hamilton road and did \$600 damage.

Farmer's Sudden Death.
Oshawa, July 29.—James Conlin
was found dead by the roadside early
yesterday morning. The doctor found
death due to acute heart disease.

Conlin, who lived on a farm about
four miles out, was in town and
started home some time in the
evening. He is supposed to have fallen
from the rig when taken with the
seizure.

His horse went home.

Dying Boy Defends Playmate.
New York, July 30.—Lying wound-
ed to death in St. John's Hospital,
Yonkers, George Pelham, Jr., only six
years old, has sturdily insisted that
the injury which brought him there
was self-inflicted. He was in great
pain, but he bore it like a stoic.

Physicians, upon an examination
and afterward announced that the bul-
let had taken such a course it was
impossible the boy could have shot
himself. He was closely questioned
and, little by little, the story was got
from him. He had been accidentally
shot by his playmate, Mildred Bax-
ter, seven years old, and rather than
get her into trouble, as he thought,
he had determined to take the blame
on himself.

Woman Hit by Automobile.
Halifax, July 30.—Granville street,
one of the principal thoroughfares of
the city, was the scene of a serious
automobile accident yesterday after-
noon, as a result of which an un-
known woman is dying at the hospi-
tal.

Two ladies were driving their car
along the street towards the north
end of the city when they ran down
the woman who was in the act of
boarding a street car. The woman's
skull was fractured and she cannot
recover.

Left \$22,000 to Church.
St. Mary's, July 30.—By the will
of the late Joseph Osmen Hutton of
Westover Park, St. James' the English
Church (Anglican) is endowed with
the sum of \$22,000.

Mr. Hutton also bequeathed \$500 to
foreign missions, \$500 to the missions
of the Bible Society and \$1,000 to the
rector, Rev. Rural Dean Taylor.

Tomato as a Vegetable.
Ottawa, July 30.—For the benefit
of the Board of Control, Taylor McVe-
ity, city solicitor, has decided after much
research, that tomatoes should be
classified as vegetables and not fruit,
a question that has been agitating fruit
dealers and Ottawa generally for the
past week or so.

British Cruiser to Interfere.
Tegucigalpa, Honduras, July 30.—
The Government here was informed
yesterday that England has sent a
cruiser from Belize to interfere in an
expedition which left British Hon-
duras to aid former President Bonilla
in his effort to recover control of this
country.

Daivies Sentenced to One Year.
Woodstock, July 30.—Rev. James A.
Daivies, a colored minister, was yester-
day sentenced to one year in the
Central Prison for sedition. The com-
plaint was a 16-year-old colored girl.
He is 52 and has a wife and children.
He was arrested in Toronto.

AUGUST WEATHER AS SEEN BY HICKS

Storms of Rain, Wind and Thun-
der Will Reach Crisis on the
8th, 9th and 10th

Prof. Hicks' weather forecasts (con-
tinued) are as follows:—A regular
storm period is central with the mer-
cury period on the 8th, covering the
9th to the 11th. Low barometer and
storms of rain, wind and thunder will
reach a crisis on and touching the 8th,
9th and 10th. This is about the most
promising rain period for this mid-
summer month. Great blustering and
electrical storms will centre on the
9th. A decided change to cooler and
more pleasant weather will follow
storms of this period for several days.

A reactionary storm period is central
on the 13th, 14th and 15th. The mer-
cury influence, together with moon's
first quarter and apogee on the 12th,
will bring a marked increase of storm
conditions early in this period. We
do not think a general sufficiency of
rainfall is to be expected this month
or during this summer, but good local
rains will be natural in many scatter-
ing sections in central to northern
states.

A regular storm period, at
the entrance of earth's autumnal equi-
nox, falls on the 13th to 22nd, central
on the 19th and full moon on the 20th.
This is another period in which may
be expected some violent mid-summer
bluster, black clouds, head rains and
thunder. The 18th to 24th is a semi-
cyclic period in which earthquakes are
sure to be reported from various ex-
tremes of the earth. Watch papers
and clip the telegraphic reports.

A reactionary storm period covers the
22nd to 25th. The astronomic condi-
tions at this time are very favorable
for dangerous storms and tidal waves
in all the gulf regions. Great storms
in the south at this time would almost
certainly induce local winds from
the north, with high winds and gen-
eral change to unseasonably cool weath-
er over most parts of the inland
states.

A regular storm period is
central on the 25th, covering the last
three days of August and eliminating
in the opening days of September.

RAIN STOPPED THE FUN

CROWD AT PARK STAMPEDED BY
STORM YESTERDAY
AFTERNOON

The rain stopped the fun at Victoria
Park yesterday afternoon. Besides be-
ing robbed of the pleasure of witness-
ing two exciting ball games, a great
number of those who had assembled
at the park were compelled to spend
between two and three hours in the
palace waiting for the storm to sub-
side.

In the early stages of the storm
quite a number of spectators were de-
termined to be as brave as the players
and remain in their places as long as
possible. Shortly after they had ar-
rived at this conclusion the rain came
down in such copious quantities and
was driven by such a terrific wind
that they were quickly stampeded.

The rain was so dense the only place
nearly affording shelter and this was
entered with as little delay as pos-
sible.

The fourth inning of the baseball
game between east and west side em-
ployers had just been completed when
the rain brought the game to an
abrupt termination. The score stood
3 to 1 in favor of the west side.

Had it not been for the rain, there
would doubtless have been a large as-
sembly at the park and a new sum-
mer record in aid of the Hospital. It has,
however, been decided to have the
same programme for next Friday after-
noon.

RESULTS OF STORM

While the storm was at its height
yesterday afternoon a barn on the
farm of Mr. Thos. Hudson, North Ox-
ford, was struck by lightning. The
building was only slightly damaged
but a cow that was standing nearby,
was killed.

Lightning also struck a window in
Zuehrig's bake-shop, at the rear of
Bosson's drug store. No damage re-
sulted other than the breaking of the
window.

laying regularly, were hatched in Feb-
ruary.

THE MARKET

LARGE ATTENDANCE AND PRICES
ABOUT THE SAME AS A
WEEK AGO.

Generally speaking the farmers are
comparatively idle to-day. They were
forced to take a rest on account of the
severe storm of yesterday afternoon.
Many of them came to town early this
morning and the indications point to
a big day's business for the merchants
generally. The attendance at the
market was the largest for several
weeks. The offerings were fairly plen-
tiful, with little change in the prices
over those of last week. Eggs re-
mained firm at 20 cents a dozen. But-
ter ranged in price from 25 to 28
cents a pound, while spring chickens
sold at 81 per pair.

CRISIS AT HAMILTON

GENERAL TIE-UP OF FREIGHT
MAY CLOSE PLANTS.

Hamilton, Ont., July 29.—The gen-
eral tie-up of freight among manu-
facturers and wholesalers is beginning
to reach a crisis here. The G.T.R.
notwithstanding reports to the con-
trary, is not giving any freight ser-
vice, and there is a possibility that
the international Harvester Works
will have to practically close down
unless the G.T.R. is able to relieve
the congestion of freight at the com-
pany's plant.

The G.T.R. have not moved any
freight for the international since the
strike began. It has been discovered
that twenty cars of machinery which
should have been shipped a week ago
are still in the yards.

The strikers say that they have been
informed that there are several cars
of foreign fruit lying in the yards
which the company has been merely
shunting cars around the yards for
several days.

\$22,000 TO CHURCH

SYNOD OF HURON MISSIONS ALSO
BENEFIT BY J.O. HUTTON'S
WILL.

London July 30.—By the will of the
late Joseph Osmen Hutton of West-
over Park, St. James' the English
Church there is endowed with the sum
of \$22,000. The interest is to be used
in the first place for the payment of
the debt upon the church hall, which
cost \$8,300. Then the interest is to
be devoted to the general work of the
synod of Huron missions; \$500 to the
Bible Society and \$1,000 to the
rector, Rev. Rural Dean Taylor.

NO PRESENT ACTION

IN REGARD TO THE VACANT REC-
TORSHIP OF ST. PAULS CATH-
EDRAL, LONDON.

London, July 30.—There will be no
action taken just at present in regard
to the vacant rectorship of St. Pauls
Cathedral, caused by the death of
Canon Dann in England on Sunday.

The procedure, when taken, will con-
sist probably in a meeting of the
members of the cathedral congrega-
tion and the appointment of a com-
mittee to confer with the bishop with
regard to an appointment.

The memorial service to the memory
of the late rector will be held at the
cathedral on Sunday morning at 11
o'clock, when the bishop will preach.

WHERE WILL THIS INDUSTRY LOCATE

Woodstock Business Men Wide
Awake in Dealing With Propo-
sition That has been Receiving
Attention Here

Woodstock, July 29.—At an enthu-
siastic meeting of the business men
of this city in the city hall tonight
it was decided to offer special induc-
ements to the Ldwin Holden Textile
Company, of Philadelphia, who for the
past two months have had their eyes
open in an endeavor to select some
suitable Canadian city in which to
start a branch.

A company will be formed in this
city and business men have been ask-
ed to subscribe \$18,000 worth of stock.
The city will be asked to furnish a
free site, and to guarantee the bonds
of the company up to \$10,000.

The foregoing is of more than ordi-
nary interest to the people of Ingersoll
and especially the Board of Trade.
For the past few weeks a proposition
of the Holden Company relative to
locating in Ingersoll has been receiving
the attention of the Board of
Trade. It has been dealt with at two
special meetings, but on account of
the keen rivalry existing between
Municipalities in regard to securing
new industries, the name of the firm
and the nature of the proposition were
withheld from the general public
pending a satisfactory culmination of
the negotiations. Many of the busi-
ness men were made acquainted with
the situation and approached in re-
gard to subscribing for bonds. The
work has been proceeding quietly, and
while the special committee did not
receive as much encouragement as
desired, they were hopeful that with
still greater efforts, Ingersoll would
secure the industry.

In view of all that has transpired
locally the despatch from Woodstock
has naturally created considerable
surprise. To say the least the unex-
pected turn of affairs emphasizes the
necessity of Ingersoll warning up for-
ward industrial propositions of merit
to a greater degree than at present
if the desired advancement from an
industrial standpoint is to be achiev-
ed.

If the facts are as stated in the dis-
patch, Woodstock business men have
been wide awake, while in Ingersoll
there apparently has been a regret-
table indifference to say the least.

It may be, however, that Woodstock
has not yet actually secured its in-
dustry, and if such be the case, Ingersoll
business men should bestir them-
selves.

RAISING MAINE A PUZZLE

WAR DEPARTMENT MAY DO THE
WORK ITSELF.

Washington, July 28.—Mr. John F.
O'Rourke, president of the O'Rourke
Construction Company, of New York,
was a visitor at the war department
today when he had a conference with
Gen. Oliver, acting secretary of war,
in regard to raising the Maine, now
lying in Havana harbor.

Mr. O'Rourke proposes to raise the
famous battleship by means of a
floating wharf, to be constructed
around the wreck. He would try to
lift her by using caissons.

Nothing has been decided by the war
department as to Mr. O'Rourke's plan
or the plans of several other contrac-
tors submitted to the department.
Congress appropriated \$300,000 at its
last session to be used in connection
with the raising of the Maine and the
investigations to be made to find the
best method of raising her.

No action will be taken by the war
department until an opinion asked for
from the attorney-general has been
received as to whether it will be nec-
essary to spend the whole \$300,000
for investigation of methods of rais-
ing the vessel or whether some of the
money may be used for actually get-
ting her to the surface.

In the haste to pass the law during
the closing days of the last Congress
a technical mistake was made in the
phraseology of the act, making it im-
possible to construe the language to
mean that part of the money should
be spent for investigation of methods
of raising the vessel and part for rais-
ing her.

It is possible that the war depart-
ment will not give the work of rais-
ing the vessel to any private contrac-
tor, it was said at the war depart-
ment today, but will do the work with
its own vessels, men and material.
