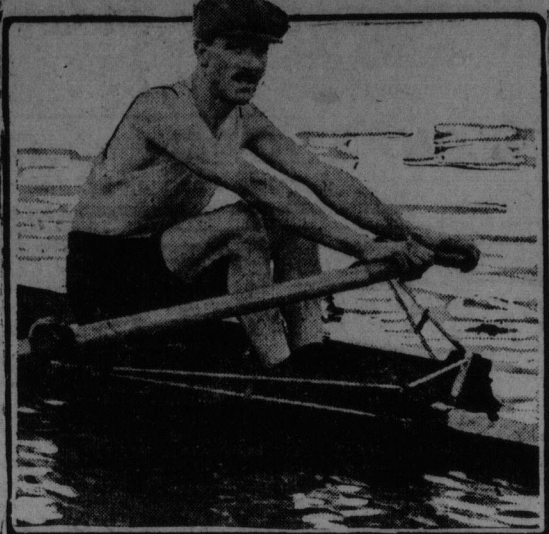

AMERICA WON SONDER RACES

Three Yankee Boats Led Their Rivals to a Finish --Chonta Gave Harpoon a Hard Battle, but the Adams Craft Nosed Home a Winner--More Racing Today.

Marble Head, Mass., Aug. 18.—America again defeated Spain today in the Sonder yacht races off this port. All three American boats leading their foreign rivals at the finish. The Harpoon, owned by C. F. Adams, 2nd, which took the first race of the series yesterday, again carried off the honors today with the Cima a close second and the Beaver third. The Spanish yacht Chonta was only a minute and one second behind the Beaver, while the Papoose and Mosquito II, were far behind. The boats started at times during the race led the entire fleet. She not only pushed the American boats hard, but astonished her rivals by maintaining her place principally through her use of the balloon fin in beating to windward. This violation of yachting precedent scratched their heads over what may prove a valuable innovation.

The yachts started in a light breeze which increased to about 7 miles an hour at the finish. It was a two and a half mile beat up the wind and a half mile to the line, with repeat. The Harpoon with the exception of a few minutes on the run down the wind for the first time, set the pace throughout. The Spaniards profiting by their experience of yesterday were on hand when the starting signal was sounded and dashed over the line only a few seconds after the signal. The Cima had the weather position and for the first few minutes was the leading boat. Soon the Harpoon and the Beaver, which went to the eastward on a long hitch, forged ahead, and at the turning mark the Harpoon had a safe lead. The Chonta was always a dangerous factor. She not only beat the Cima and Beaver, but was on only 44 seconds behind the Harpoon at the turn. The Papoose also was close up, but the Mosquito II had dropped steadily astern. On the slide down the wind for the first time, the Harpoon, Cima, Beaver and Chonta ran very fast the three stern boats closing up on the leader. A quarter of a mile from the finish the Chonta pushed ahead of the Harpoon and for about 5 minutes was the leading boat.

Harpoon Gains. The Harpoon drew away from the Cima on the second beat, to windward while the Cima and Beaver gained on the Chonta and all four pushed far ahead of the Papoose and Mosquito II. The Harpoon had a lead of 55 seconds over the Cima at the windward mark on the second time around, a minute and 15 seconds over the Beaver and 2 minutes and 33 seconds over the Chonta.

On the run down the wind, to the finish Captain Adams, of the Harpoon, took it leisurely, while the Cima and Beaver went off on a luffing match which permitted the Chonta to draw up again. In the last half mile, however, the Cima and Beaver gained. The breeze increased somewhat and the Papoose and Mosquito II, made up a little lost time near the finish. The Harpoon easily crossed the finish line in the lead, with the Cima, Beaver and Chonta well bunched a bit in the rear.

The yachts will sail over a triangular course tomorrow, after which according to the rules, all boats which have not won a race, will be eliminated from the series. The winners will continue in the contest for the President Taft cup, while the Governor Draper cup will be awarded on points. The elapsed time of today's race follows: Harpoon, C. F. WOODSTOCK MAKE IT 5-0

Calais Shut Out on Home Diamond Before 2,500 People—Peasley Allowed Two Hits.

St. Stephen, N. B., Aug. 18.—Over twenty five hundred people saw great ball played on the Calais diamond this afternoon when Woodstock met Calais for the rubber in a series of three games. Calais had shut Woodstock out in the first, Woodstock scored three and Calais one in the second and today the mighty Peasley and his supporters shut out Calais five to nothing.

The batteries were Peasley and Wilson for Woodstock, Ryan and Cobb for Calais. The other most prominent player on the field was Woodstock's Indian Neptune. Peasley only struck out six men to Ryan's ten, but the strike of the man from Bucknhead land were ineffectual and numbered only one or two safe ones. The Woodstock end of the game was played without an error and Calais had very few.

Not until the sixth inning did a Calais man see first base. Spinney reached it on a tap by a pitched ball, but was out at second. Cobb also got first in that inning but did not hit. In the ninth Chism walked and reached third giving Calais its only hope for a score, but Murchie fanned and was the third man out. Woodstock brought the strongest aggregation of ball players that was ever seen on the border. For a losing team Calais put up wonderful ball, never conceding an inch until the last attempt at bat had been made. A very large amount of money changed hands on the result. Woodstock made two runs in the third, two in the fifth and one in the seventh. E. Doyle was a satisfactory umpire.

Great Interest Manifested in Contest on Shamrock Grounds--Thistles are Largely Imported Men.

Memories of the old day's when the Roses and Alerts defeated the fastest visiting teams from Maine and throughout the provinces will be recalled this afternoon when on the same grounds the St. Peters will go up against the St. Stephen Thistles, recognized as one of the fastest ball teams in Northern Maine and New Brunswick.

The St. Stephen battery is said to be the strongest to come here this year, many critics declaring that Carter, St. Stephen's pitcher, is Peasley's master. Although not possessing the speed of the Woodstock south paw, Carter is said to have a repertoire of curves not possessed by Peasley, and that he plays a better fielding game. Their infield is as snappy as any in the city, while the outfield is looked upon by the critics as the fastest in the province. Frank Harrington as a pitcher ranks second to none in this portion of the country. He has curves to burn, is cool and collected at all times, and fields his position with machine like precision. If working good today a great pitcher's battle should result. McGowan will be behind the bat and can always be relied upon to play a steady game.
