IN GERMAN PARLIAMENT DEMANDS
THE RESTORATION OF BELGIUM

London, April 7 (4.45 p. m.)—A Reuter despatch says: "There was an uproar in the Reichstag yesterday when Hugo Haase, leader of the newly formed Socialist minority group, declared that his party was strongly opposed to partition of Poland, and demanded the restoration of Belgium."

"The Baltic peoples, Lithuanians and Letts, did not desire union with Germany before the war," said Herr Haase. "The injustice done to Belgium must be compensated for her by restoration as a state. In 1913 Herr Von Jagow (foreign minister) declared Germany would uphold their neutrality. Thus all the more surprising was the chancellor's announcement on August 4, 1914, that German troops probably had crossed the Belgian border."

Herr Von Jagow said in reply: "Herr Haase has dashed up again old Belgian stories. When I made the declaration about Belgian neutrality I considered her a neutral country. It has been thoroughly proved that the responsibility for what has happened lies on Belgium's side."

Soldiers Can Vote.
Soldiers, British subjects, who were living in St. John at the time of en-

listment can vote without having to pay taxes, providing they appear before Clerk Wardrop any time before the closing of the polls Monday, and on election day, and make the necessary declaration. The law reads as follows:

"During the continuance of the present war, at any election for Mayor or Commissioner, or at any election upon the initiative, referendum, or recall, upon the application to the Common Clerk of the City of St. John of any male resident of the said city, being a British subject of twenty-one years of age or upwards, who has been appointed to or has enlisted in His Majesty's Forces for overseas service, and is in the said city at the time of such election, and upon satisfactory proof that he was a resident of the said city at the time he was appointed to or enlisted in such forces as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the said Common Clerk to add the name of any such person to the List of Voters, and any such person whose name shall be so added by the Common Clerk shall be entitled to vote at such election as though he was a duly qualified voter, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in any Act or Acts relating to civic elections within the City of Saint John."

Col. McLean gave a dinner last night at the CHM Club in honor of General Benson of Halifax, who is in the city on an inspection trip. General Benson and Col. McLean will leave this morning for Woodstock, where they will inspect the men and quarters there. Tonight they will go to Fredericton and will spend Sunday and Monday morning there. Monday afternoon they will go to Sussex and inspect the 104th at that place. There will be a garrison church parade again on Sunday. The 140th will attend St. David's, the 115th, Centenary. It has not been decided just what churches the 69th and Composite Battery will attend. The battalions will meet at King Square at 10.35 and march down King street to Market Square and

march from there to the various churches. Civic elections, O. C. units in St. John will give leave of absence on Saturday morning to officers, N. C. O.'s and men who desire to register at City Hall as voters in the civic elections which take place on Monday next. The necessary leave of absence will also be granted on Monday for the purpose of enabling officers, N. C. O.'s and men voting.

The men and quarters of the 115th were inspected yesterday by Major-General Benson. The battalion was drawn up in close column of companies and went through the different movements in a very satisfactory manner. The quarters were also inspected and found to be in good condition. Six men were taken on the strength of the battalion. Today the orderly officer will be Lieut. Clarkson and the barrack fatigue parade will be the principal feature of the work for the day.

The morning was spent in routine work yesterday by the 140th. In the afternoon the battalion was inspected by Major-General Benson and considering the length of time they have been in training made a very creditable showing. Six men were added to the strength. Today Lieut. Kirk will be the officer of the day and the usual Saturday clean-up will be in order.

Yesterday the 69th were given a thorough inspection by Major-General Benson. The battalion was drawn up on the exhibition grounds and gave the general salute as the inspecting party arrived. They were put through a number of movements and gave general satisfaction by the way in which they did their work. Today the men will have bayonet fighting, knotting and lashing and musketry exercise in the morning and the afternoon will be a half holiday.

Major-General T. Benson, O. C. military division No. 6, arrived in the city yesterday morning on a visit of inspection. He was accompanied by Major A. H. Jones, Capt. J. R. Jago and Lieut. A. A. Miller. About ten o'clock, accompanied by Brigadier-Col. McLean, Lieut.-Col. Powell, Major Stethem and Capt. Logan they repaired to the army to inspect the 69th and 115th. Conditions of service and rate of pay will be the same as for any other unit.

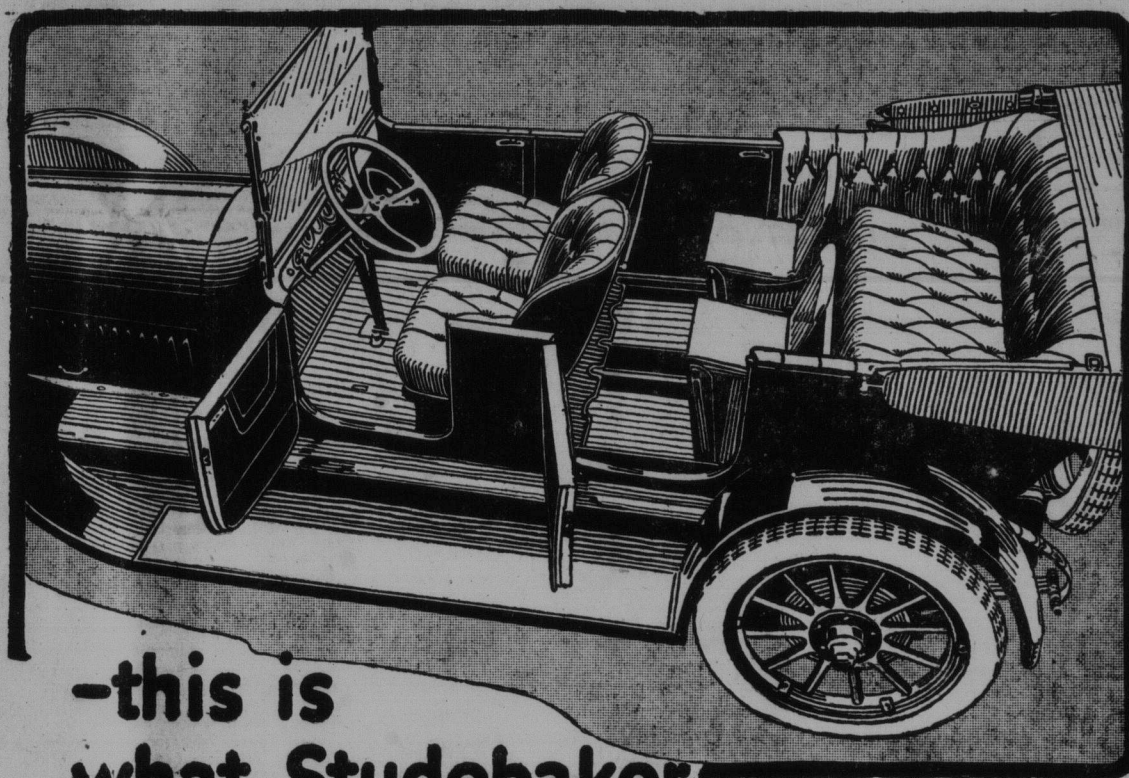
Meeting at Kingston.
