

SAILORS JUMP OVERBOARD AND LOSE LIVES

No Trace of Them Along North Shore After They Left Norwegian Steamer on Way to Sea.

Chatham, Oct. 4.—Two sailors of the Norwegian S.S. Landroff have in all probability been drowned. They jumped overboard on Sunday at Gordon's Flats while the steamer was on her way to sea, and although the vessel was stopped and search made no trace of them could be found. An Indian living on the shore at that place says they didn't reach land. The captain came to town and reported the matter to the Norwegian consul. The sailors were Spaniards and had been arrested for attempting to desert. It is reported they had made the remark they would never cross in that steamer.

The scarcity of men has raised the wages of the lumbermen to an unprecedented scale. From \$32 to \$38 a month is being offered by lumbermen for men, according to course, to the experience and capabilities of the employer. One firm is reported to have given \$40 a month to its best man. The war has taken away a good many of the woodsmen, and it is said enough men cannot be had to handle the cut at any price.

S.S. ADRIATIC FLED FROM HER PROTECTOR

British Patrol Mistaken for Hun Submarine, Big Liner Made Dash for Safety.

New York, Oct. 5.—A British patrol boat, mistaken for a German submarine, gave officers and passengers of the S. S. Adriatic a bad scare when the ship was one day out from Liverpool on her voyage to New York, ended today. The Adriatic's lookout, sighting a low lying shape in the morning mist pursuing the ship, reported it to the captain as a submarine. That officer, taking no chances, blew four warning blasts on the whistle, which meant that the passengers were to seize life preservers and stand by the lifeboats. This they did, many in terror. Meantime the captain put the helm over so sharply that it seemed as if the big ship heeled over on her beam ends.

Speeding at twenty knots the Adriatic tried to escape from her pursuer. An hour later, while the excitement on the ship was intense, the mist lifted enough to disclose that the pursuing vessel flew the British flag, a patrol boat which was supposed to be protecting the ship from German craft she was mistaken for, and had lost the Adriatic during the night.

FIVE OF CREW LOST.

Lunenburg, N. S., Oct. 3.—With her flags drooping at half-mast, the schooner Leta J. Schwartz, Capt. John Schwartz, arrived in port this morning and reported the loss of five of her crew in the sale of September 24th. The men, who were bending a sail, were all washed overboard by a sea that swept dories and everything movable overboard. There is only one dory left on the schooner, and that is badly damaged. Captain Schwartz was in the water for several hours, and his injuries during the storm. The Leta J. Schwartz was the last schooner of the fleet to come home.
