In the Admiralty Court, Halifax, evidence is being taken before Registrar J. L. Barnhill in the case against the steamer Emanuel Nobel for salvage services near Sheet harbor. The plaintiffs are the F. W. Roebeling Co., Ltd., owners of the tug F. W. Roebeling, the Halifax and Canso Steamship Co., owners of the steamer Scotia and the Halifax and Sheet harbor S. S. Margaret and the claim is for \$100,000 for salvage services rendered by these steamers to the Emanuel Nobel on December 26th near Sheet harbor.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been a resident of a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction and such arable or farm land, if stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions.
