soldiers' dependents to show total dis-
ability in order to obtain aid or other
forms of support from the separation
allowance branch, but that such aid
should be apportioned according to sup-
port purposes.

Work Unfairly.

Mr. Burnham cited cases to show
that the present method of granting
allowance to soldiers' dependents
worked unfairly. It was a very ser-
ious matter, he said, and apt to in-
duce fraud and bring about the great-
est possible hardships.

Major-General Newburn replied
that the subject required great con-
sideration. Separation allowances
had been granted to dependents on
defined and definite terms. To go in-
to the question of apportionment
would require an enormous staff and
enormous responsibility would be
thrown on the department in investi-
gating every single case.

He suggested that the motion be
withdrawn.

W. F. Nickle, (Kingston) thought
the matter should not be put aside
quite so easily.

"If men," Mr. Nickle declared,
"are going to be taken compulsorily,
then, I say, when a man goes, it is
the duty of the state to supplement
the income of those whose income
has been depleted."

T. M. Tweedle, (Calgary) supported
this view. He thought that the separa-
tion fund had not been established on
a basis of justice and equity.

The motion was finally withdrawn
by Mr. Burnham.

Steamship Service.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux drew the
attention of the House to the inade-
quacy of the steamship service be-
tween Pictou and the Magdalen Is-
lands and also between Montreal,
Quebec and the various harbors of
Gaspé.

Sir George Foster, in replying to
Mr. Lemieux, stated that it was ex-
tremely difficult to get steamers for
these services. The war had added
to the difficulties of his department
and the department of marine and

fisheries, in their effort to keep these
services open. He assured Mr. Lem-
ieux that everything possible would
be done to maintain the services. The
steamer "Amelia," which had been on
the Magdalen Islands route, was, he
admitted, unsatisfactory, but she was
absolutely the only steamer available.
Captain Read (Prince Edward Is-
land) asked the government what it
proposed to do with the steamer
"Northumberland" which has been
plying between Summerside and
Tucker, K. C. The prime minister,
quoted by Mr. Lemieux, said this was
a most important question.

Speaker Rhodes drew the attention
of the house to the fact that the Mag-
dalen Islands and Gaspé Bay services
were under consideration and not the
Prince Edward Island service.

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of
marine, expressed his appreciation of
Mr. Lemieux's references to the action
of the department in sending the
steamer "Stanley" to the Magdalen
Islands. Referring to the telegram
quoted by Mr. Lemieux, asking that
the "Stanley" be again sent to the
Islands, Mr. Ballantyne promised to
consider the matter at once and see
if this could be done.

which have passed between Mr. Henry
Tucker, K. C., the prime minister, the
department of militia and the officers

Mistakes had been made and since he
assumed office he had begun a reor-

C. G. Power (Quebec South) quoted

while cabins were vacant. Mr. Pow-

condition.

made overseas. Three or four weeks
ago an officer was sent overseas to
take up with the overseas authorities
the question of berthing and accom-
modation.

**Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.**

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years of age, who was at the commencement of the
present war, and has since continued to be a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
may homestead a quarter-section of unoccupied
Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or
Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict. Entry by proxy may be made on certain
conditions. Duties—Six months residence usual
and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homestead may be secured
on a quarter-section as pre-emption.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months
in each of three years after securing homestead
patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain
pre-emptive patent as soon as homestead patent on
certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 50 acres and secure a homestead
work \$300.00.

Holders of entries may obtain time of employment
as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resi-
dence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
for entry, returned soldiers who have served over-
seas and have been honorably discharged, receive
one-day priority in applying for entry at local
Agency Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge
papers must be presented to Agent.
