The Hague, Aug. 28—The Palace of Peace was inaugurated here this afternoon when the ceremony of handing the edifice over to the charge of the Dutch foreign minister was carried out in the great court in the presence of Queen Wilhelmina, the Dowager Queen Emma and Prince Consort Henry. These were surrounded by a distinguished gathering of diplomats, representatives of peace societies and people prominent in all the arts and sciences.

Abraham Van Karnebek, president of the Carnegie Foundation, with a splendid speech, handed the palace into the care of its appointed custodians. He eulogized the interest shown in the peace movement by the queen, emphasized the significance of the inauguration of the palace and expressed a full meed of thems. For the generosity of Andrew
