

CANADIAN HORSES AT SARTOGA.

MOONSTONE.

The fourth race at Saratoga on the 28th ult. was a handicap steeplechase for a purse of \$500, of which \$100 went to the second horse. Three horses, the property of different owners, to start or no race; the distance about two and a quarter miles, starting in the east field opposite the three-quarter post. Four horses started. These were F. Smyth's bay horse Waller, by Hurray—Queen of Club, 5 years old, carrying 163 lbs; L. Hunt's chestnut horse, Redding, by Harry of the West, dam by Jo Stoner, 5 years old, 145 lbs; John Lawler's bay horse Moonstone, by Asteroid—Alabama, aged, 133 lbs, and C. Reed's bay gelding Doubtful, by Oyster-man, Jr.—Spotted Fawn, 4 years old, 126 lbs. Redding was the favorite, selling for \$280; Waller, \$250; Doubtful, \$70; Moonstone, \$50. The start was good one, Moonstone leading, Doubtful second, Waller third, Redding fourth. The horses started in the east field, near the three-quarter pole, and they went over the first impediment, which was a wall, in the order given above. Then they ran to the centre of the field and jumped over a hedge and then another hedge at the big tree without changing places. The horses then came to the north section of the water jump, at which place Moonstone showed the way by two lengths, Waller second, Doubtful third, and Redding fourth; but the latter fell heavily on landing and ran after the other horse's riders. Waller ran at the lead as he jumped the two fences of the fractional track and went over the wall in the centre of the field, followed closely by Moonstone and Doubtful. Jumping down the embankment after getting out of the west field, and crossing the regular track in front of P. Lorillard's stable, Waller ran the wrong way for a hundred yards and had to turn back and begin anew. This gave Moonstone the race, as he had nothing to do but go on and win. He took the fences and walls in front of Mr. Belmont's stables, jumped the fences on each side of the regular track, then into and out of the west field, then over the two fences of the fractional track, then into the east field, where he jumped a hedge and a wall and next the west section of the hedge and water in front of the grand stand, Doubtful following within six lengths of him. He then crossed the fractional track, jumped a wall in the west field, then two hedges, next a wall, then a hedge and again a wall, and, running up close to the fence of the fractional track, jumped into the regular track, leading at this time four lengths. Doubtful closed a little on him as he ran around the lower turn, where a hurdle was stationed, and coming into the homestretch for the last last hurdle and the struggle home he was but one length in front of Doubtful. At the last hurdle, stationed at the furlong pole, Moonstone had one length the best of it, and getting over safely he came away and won the race by six lengths. Waller came in some time afterwards, having this time gone the correct road. Time, 4:47.

The judges not being satisfied with Towson's (the rider of Waller) answer to questions put to him as to his running the wrong way in the race, after visiting the grounds and noticing the road he took, finally decided to expel him from the grounds of the Saratoga Association forever, which of course debars him from training or riding horses on any track in this country. Some other people will be looked after by the association and receive the same punishment that Towson has received if found to be in complicity with Towson.

BOMBARDIER

The second race on the 28th ult. was for a purse of \$350, of which \$50 was to be given to the second horse, a free handicap for three-year-olds, the distance one mile and a quarter. The horses started, consisting of Paxon & Wimmer's chestnut filly Bradamant, by War dance—Breuna, 107 lbs; C. W. Medinger's bay colt Wash Booth, by Asteroid—Vandalla, 103 lbs; John Lawler's bay colt Bombardier, by Baywood—General, 97 lbs; D. McDaniel's bay colt Major Barlow, by Asteroid—Schottische, 105 lbs; and

Queen of Clubs, 5 years old, carrying 154 lbs; J. T. Blanchard's bay gelding Bambino, by Baywood—Bay Ruth's dam, 4 years old, 125 lbs; and Fisher & Carson's brown gelding Kelso, by Voucher—Kate Leonard, aged, 187 lbs. Waller was the favorite for this race, Kelso second choice. The latter won the race.

At the fall of the flag Kelso took the lead, followed by Waller and Bambino. The last named was so slow that he never had any chance for the race. When Kelso reached the first hurdle he was three lengths in front of Waller, and at the stand he led by five lengths, as he also did over the second hurdle, with Bambino eight lengths behind Waller. Rounding the turn McBride took a pull on Kelso, which enabled Waller to close up considerable of the gap, a length only separating them at the third hurdle, while at the fourth it was only half a length, both jumping in fine style. Running round the turn they got even and ran so into the stretch, when Kelso again took the lead and led over the fifth hurdle by half a length, and, coming right away, won by two and a half lengths in 2:21.

RULES FOR GLASS BALL TRAP SHOOTING.

We are in receipt of so many queries regarding the rules for Glass Ball shooting, that we append the same below, as obtained from Captain Bogardus:

1st. All matches or sweepstakes shall be shot from three traps placed ten yards apart, eighteen yards rise, and the choice of trap to be decided by the referee, by drawing a gun-wad from his pocket and showing to trap puller.

2d. Pulling of traps—the trap puller shall stand six feet behind the shooter. The traps shall be numbered 1, 2, and 3. The referee shall have three gun-wads, upon each a number corresponding to the trap. When the shooter is at the score to shoot, the referee will then draw a wad from his pocket and show it to trap puller; the trap puller will then say, Ready! after which the shooter calls Pull! In all cases the puller must pull fair for each shooter. If the trap is sprung before the shooter has given the word, he can take the shot or not; but if he shoots, the ball or balls shall be scored, whether broken or not, as the case may be.

3d. Referee—in all cases, a referee shall be appointed, and his decision shall be final. In case the trap, when sprung, breaks the ball, the referee, in all cases, shall require the party to shoot at another ball, whether he shoots or not.

4th. Position at the score—After a shooter has taken his position at the score, he shall not level his gun, or raise the butt above the crown until he calls pull. Should he infringe on this rule, the ball or balls shall be scored as lost, whether broken or not.

5th. All balls must be broken in the air to count, a shot on the ground, shall be scored as lost.

6th. There shall be no restriction as to size of shot used, or charge of powder, but the charge of shot shall not exceed 1 1/2 oz., Dixon's measure. Any one using larger quantity of shot shall forfeit all rights in the matches. After a gun is loaded and chambered, and the shooter discharges his gun, the penalty will be the same as for over-loading.

7th. All ties to be shot off at 21 yards rise, at five single balls each, and in case of tie, to be shot off at 15 yards rise, and so on, until decided. In all cases, ties must be shot off under sunset, or postponed until next day, unless the referee and shooter otherwise decide.

8th. In double shooting, the distance shall be 10 yards rise, and from two traps 10 yards apart. Ties shot off at 15 yards rise, at three pair balls each; and in case of second ties, three more pair each, and so on until decided. In all cases both traps must be sprung at the same time.

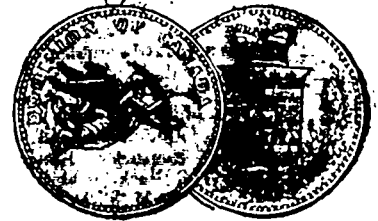

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

Dominion Rules to govern.  
 Trotting to be made heats, 3 in 5, in harness.  
 Entrance 10 per cent. of purse, and must accompany nomination. Entries by telegraph to be followed by letter containing entry fee. Half-forfeit in handicap is declared out by 10 o'clock of the morning of the race. No conditional entries. 40 per cent. of first money for a walk-over. Horses to be eligible at close of entries. No money to be distanced or ruled out horses. Entries to be made in writing, giving name and colors of owner, name, color, sex, age, sire and dam of horse. In weight-for-age races, mares and geldings allowed three pounds. Heats may be alternated, or the order of races changed. Ineligible horses forfeit entrance money.  
 Entries close on Friday, September 7, and must be addressed to the Secretary, Turf Club House, 40 King St. West., Toronto.
