Baby, Hon. François. [Stadacona.]
S. of the late Hon. F. Baby, formerly a member of the Executive Council of L. C., and Adjt. Genl. of Mıltia. Elected to the Leg. Council in 1861.—St. Lewis St., Quebec. Hon. F. Baby, 2258. T. Fournier, 958.

Belleau, Hon. Sir Narcisse Fortunat, Kt., Q. C. [L. M.]
Has been Mayor of Quebec; called to the Bar of L. C.,
26th Dec., 1832. M. Miss Gauvreau, dau. of the late L. Gauvreau, Esq., formerly a member of the L. C. Legislature.
Was knighted by H. R. H. the Prince of Wales on the occasion of his visit to Canada, in 1860. Was speaker of the
Legislature Council from 26th Nov., 1857, to 1st Aug., 1858,
and from 7th Aug., 1858, to 20th March, 1862. Appointed
Minister of Agriculture 27th March, 1862. Called to the
Legislative Council 23rd Oct., 1852.—St. Lewis St., Quebec.

Blair, Hon. Adam J. Fergusson. [Brook.]
Is a Barrister at Law of U. C. and a Bencher of the Law Society. Sat for Waterloo, from Feb. 1849 to June 1854, and for Wellington, S. R., from the latter date to 1857. Elected to Leg. Council in 1860. Assumed the name of Blair after that of Fergusson on his succeeding to the Blair Estates, Scotland 1862.—Guelph, C. W.

BOULTON, Hon. George Strange. [L. M.]
Third S. of the late Hon. D'Arcy Boulton, formerly of the Middle Temple, London, and afterwards one of the Judges of the Court of Queen's Bench in Upper Canada, and grandson of the late Sir John Strange, formerly Master of the Rolls, England. The family is of some antiquity. (See Burke's Landed Gentry.) B. in 1797 in the State of New York.
