An Act for the Relief of Gertrude Flessie Patterson.

WHEREAS Gertrude Bessie Patterson, of the Bayfield Preamble. Ranch, near the City of Calgary, in the District of Alberta, in the North-west Territories of Canada, wife of George Patterson, of the same place, rancher, has by her 5 petition set forth, that on the eighth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, they were lawfully married at the City of Calgary aforesaid; that they cohabited together as husband and wife until in or about the month of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, when 10 he deserted her and has not since resided or cohabited with her; that shortly after he deserted her as aforesaid she learned that he had committed adultery at various times between the month of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and the date of his said desertion; that he has, since the month 15 of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, committed adultery on several occasions; and whereas she has humbly prayed that the said marriage may be dissolved and that she may be authorized to marry again, and that such further relief may be afforded her as is deemed meet; and 20 whereas she has proved the said allegations of her petition, and it is expedient that the prayer thereof should be granted: Therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :---

- 25 I. The said marriage between the said Gertrude Bessie Marriage Patterson and George Patterson, her husband, is hereby dissolved and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.
- 2. The said Gertrude Bessie Patterson may, at any time Right to 30 hereafter, marry any man whom she might lawfully marry marry again, if the said marriage with the said George Patterson had not been solemnized.
