In 1934 I did not make a formal application but the Indians used the land for grazing and re-arranged their fence as requested by the Department of actional Defence (Militia Services) If as stated in their letter attached herete, Section 7, Swi-16, All 17, and 18, Si-19, and Section 20 in Township 34, Mange 5, West of 3rd, are now under the control of the Department of the Interior, I would ask that these lands be reserved for grazing purpose for the Indians stock only.

The Indians inform me that last autumn certain parties from Saskatoon brought out a large number of sheep which they kept on the northern portion of the lease, where the grass was damaged, being eaten (cropped) off close to the roots. The Indians were told by the parties who looked after the sheep that that they had permission from the Government to keep them there, hence the reason why the matter was not brought to my attention until this spring. They, the Indians, thinking I knew of the matter

As stated in my \$7744-24-94 of February 5th,1932, we have not sufficient land on the Indian "eserve for grazing. If we cannot continue to use the lands mentioned above we will have to reduce our herd and if this should have to be done the indians will be unable to provide for themselves as well as they did in the past, which will mean assisting them or direct relief, which I would be most sorry to see take place.
