REPORT

of

Examination of the Weymontachi Indian Reserve. Que.

The total area of this reserve is 7407 acres, of which 74% can be regarded as suitable for agriculture.

The balance of theland area is mostly swamp and rock.

The country is undulating in character, except for an area of about 1200 acres situated N.W. fro the Village, which is comparatively flat.

The soil is light and sandy, and in several sections there is considerable evidence of surface stone and rock.

The timber on the Reserve is very dense although not of great size. There are however several stands of good sprace and birch, which would cut out a name proportion of merchantable lumber.

It is singular to note, that up to the present time there is no evidence of the visitation of fire, although perhaps with the advent of the Railroad, forest fires will in all probability occur, if not immediately checked.

A plan of the Reserve showing the lands and Timber is herewith attached with an estimate.
