Dear Mr. Heydt:

I got back to Ottawa this morning, and this afternoon received your kind note of the 19th instant.

-- I return herewith the signature cards, filled out as indicated, and wish to thank you for the trouble to which you have gone in arranging for the deposit with the Fifth Avenue Bank. As I had a deposit in the Fifth Avenue Bank for some little time a year or two ago, the Bank will probably still have in its possession of my signature duly certified. I intended to mention this circumstance to you, but apparently omitted to do so.

-- I enclose receipt for cheque received this morning from Mr. Rockefeller's office. Perhaps you would let me know to whom subsequent receipts of a like kind should be mailed. There was nothing in the communication with which the cheque was enclosed to indicate to whom it would be best to send the receipt.

I have asked Mr. McGregor to make out a statement of the outstanding expenses of our Colorado trip, and let you have it early next week, together with the other statement which you and he talked over together while in Colorado. I have asked him to indicate how the balance stands in our books, in addition to the \$200.00 which you have deposited in New York. If you find the amount at variance in any particular with your own figures, I should be obliged if you would let me know at once.

I was glad to know that Mrs. Rockefeller was none the worse for the journey back, and that you had both arrived safely. I saw Mr. Rockefeller in Chicago the day before yesterday, and presume he will be safely home by the time this letter reaches you.

I was sorry not to see you to say Goodbye the night you left Denver, but I hope it may not be long before we may have opportunity of recalling together some of the many pleasant incidents of this last trip.
