WHAT IS A CHAMPION?

EDITOR, Farm and Dairy—I would like to have you let me know through your columns what you consider a champion can advertise his cow "Canadian Champion," when she does not freshen inside of the required 15 months, and therefore does

not qualify under the R.O.P. rules?

I see from time to time stock pens and display ads. headed by the name of a cow as Canadian champion, and she is not bred to qualify. Is this square business? I don't think so. If it is, pretty soon all cows can be called Canadian champions, and you haven't to breed her to get it either.

Editor, I own the present Champion R.O.P. cow of Canada, and frankly believe that if she were not bred to freshen early after calving her test she would have made about 5,000 more lbs. in her record, and the other fellow who didn't breed his cow but made a large record, gets the honor. Judge for yourself. Is it square?

THE PEACH HOLE HERD OF Ayrshire.

A PARTICULARLY REMARKABLE type of Ayrshire exhibited at Ottawa Winter Fair were four from the herd of R. T. Brovles of Hemmingford, Que. This is one of the coming herds. At the present time, it consists of 50 head of registered Ayrshires, practically all of which have been raised and bred on the Peach Hole.

Mr. Brovles has specialized on the utility type of animal. One of the cows in his herd would pass for a full sister to Jean Armour. She is coloring straight top and strong heart.

The big development in digestive capacity and udder, typical of the Ayrshire. A feature of the udders in this herd is the development of the large, well-placed teats.

This was very brought out in the four animals that he had at Ottawa. All of them have never received more than the usual good care at Peach Hole.

Every one of them came within the mark, scoring a total of 177.54; 169.02; 133.78, in the test. They are a deep, vigorous, strong-bodied type, fit for both show and utility purposes.
