WHILE going through the readywear and dress goods departments of the large stores in Toronto last week, the tendency was to feel rather sceptical when we passed upon the array of summer dressery. One could not complain of a meagre assortment of costumes or materials from which to make a selection; in fact, there was so much to choose from that the difficulty would be to come to a decision on some particular article. We were interested in looking some of the new sleeveless jackets and came across a very pretty one which might easily be fashioned by our home dressmakers. The material was white crepe with a narrow blue line running through it to form good sized checks. white, gave it the appearance of being very clean and neat. This jacket was a model of the front, being considerably wider in the back than the front and graduating down to nothing. Fitting of blue rope to match the blue line around the arm holes, collar, around the bottom, and lapels of the pockets were made of the blue. A belt about three inches wide and fastening at the underarm seam was the finishing touch. A jacket such as this is not fastened down from the waist, but falls apart loosely. If one has a white blouse or they can have quite a chic outfit by making a jacket somewhat similar to the one we have described.

2496—A Pretty Frock. The waist and skirt effects are usually considered to most children and this style is unique. It will be seen in the smaller views. It may be made very simply or be quite dainty if the Black Jacket is added and trimmed with lace. Four sizes: 4, 6, 8 and 10 years.

2488—Dress for Misses and Small Women.—The round neck effect on the blouse and dress is very popular this season. This dress shows up the round neck to good advantage. The whole dress is very loose, and should be becoming to night figures. Three sizes: 16, 18 and 20 years.

2500—Lady's Costume.—There are so many dainty bordered materials from

which to make a selection this summer, the one should not find it difficult to work out a dress such as the one here shown in a pretty material. The silk faille material would look very handsome if fashioned from this model. The design calls for two patterns, 10 cents for each. The blouse is cut in size from 34 to 44 inches bust measure and the skirt from 28 to 34 inches waist measure.

2507—Girls' Dress.—Material with a design along the lower edge would make up nicely if constructed from the model for the small girl. It is simple but quite effective and no doubt will appeal to many of our little women. Four sizes: 4, 6, 8 and 10 years.

2489—Lady's House Dress.—Perhaps in the rush of work you have not been able to get that house dress made up. If this model may suggest itself as a suitable one for you. It is simple, but cool and comfortable looking. Seven sizes: 34 to 46 inches bust measure.

2492—Lady's House.—A white voile or muslin blouse is always dainty and not when laundered and suitable for almost any occasion when one wishes to wear a suit. The style here shown is rather unique and should therefore prove a favorite to many. Its attractiveness would be greatly added to of course by the use of dainty lace.
