**HYDRO "SAFETY FIRST"**

A short time ago a resident of a nearby city was killed by touching an electric light socket in his house. The current issue of the Electrical News contains an Editorial on this accident, part of which is reproduced below, and which is worthy of your attention:

"Once more the necessity of grounding the secondary side of distributing transformers has been brought home to us in the tragic death of a private resident of \_\_\_\_\_, as the apparent result of a short circuit between the primary service wires and the low voltage lines entering the house. After hearing the evidence on both sides, the coroner's jury's finding was that death would not have occurred had the system been grounded as modern practice demands.

"In a matter of this sort, it is of course very difficult to lay the blame on the most faulty party. One thing is certain, however—this man's death is the direct result of somebody's neglect to do his duty. The necessity of grounding is recognized beyond question. Why then was the system not grounded?"

Patriotic Program at the Brant Was Greatly Enjoyed by the Soldiers.

It was a stirring scene last night at the Brant Theatre as the men of the active service company responding to Manager Moule's invitation entered the music hall singing lustily "Tipperary."

A hearty hand clap greeted their sturdy appearance and the audience joined in the deep chorus of the marching ditty as the men filed down the centre aisle to the front seats. The theatre itself was a scene which blended well with patriotic sentiment; the huge drop curtain hung with the Canadian Jack, the old Union Jack and the Ensign, while their Majesties' portraits graced either side of the stage. Martial selections from the orchestra, with movies to portray their scenes made chorus after chorus resound from the soldiers.

Jim Whitaker and Verner O'Neill must have got the reception of their lives and the young Brantford volunteer's rendering of "Soldier's and Gentlemen" was given all the spirit and vive de joie of soldiers of the King, from his delighted hearers. Turn after turn eminently in keeping with such a night were staged and the war series pictures of Belgian soldiers and British diehards, dusty, sweaty and hard looking as they rode along the roads around Antwerp were greeted and made the subject of admiring comment.
