THE FILIPINO ARMY

Defeated, Discouraged and Scattered Give Hopes for Peace.

NATIVES RETURNING HOME.

Brig.-Gen. Harrison Gray Ota, Who Has Sailed for America, Says He Believes the Insurrection Has Received Its Death Blow—The Official Despatch From Gen. Ota.

Manila, April 4.—The natives continue returning to their homes. They are coming in all about the American lines, and many of them, seeing the promises of good treatment are fuller, are indicating their relatives to return to their homes.

A DESTROYER SENT.

Troops Will Promptly Follow in Order to Protect British Interests in the Canton, China, District.

London, April 4.—According to a Hong Kong correspondent at Canton, a British torpedo boat destroyer has been sent there to protect British interests.

The Peking correspondent of the Times says: "The Chinese authorities have made known to Great Britain at Tientsin, the port of Peking, that the whole force recently opened at Port Chingtao is reserved for the protection of British interests."

"Friendly relations continue between the German legation and the British legation in Canton, and China offers a great railway concession if the German troops are withdrawn."

Peking, April 4.—The Hongkong authorities are pressing for an extension of the territory ceded to Great Britain by the treaties of Canton and Hankow, on the ground that more land is needed for Government buildings.

They propose to build a custom house for the collection of Chinese revenues, and promise to increase the opium duties to 400,000 annually if the extension is granted. In case of refusal they threaten to remove the Chinese custom house from this territory.

London, April 4.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says that Great Britain have arrived at an agreement in official circles with the Italian government of Samsun and the province of Chikiang, China, before April 30.

London, April 4.—The Hongkong correspondent of the Times writes: "Flourish has been posted in the Kowloon hinterland inviting the people to stop the British officials from entering there, and the officials have returned to Hongkong because of threatening attacks of the Chinese."

Hongkong, April 4.—It is reported that the Chinese have captured Captain Henry Francis May, superintendent of the Hongkong police, and two companies of Welsh Fusiliers went to Canton last night on the torpedo boat destroyer sent there to protect British interests.

The torpedo destroyer Famine followed at daybreak this morning with 300 men. The Hongkong regulars are under orders to proceed to Canton.

AMERICAN TRADE METHODS.

British Bridge Builders Hint at United States Corruption.

London, April 4.—The continued dissensions among British contractors at the fact that a Philadelphia firm has succeeded in obtaining the contract to build the bridge over the River Schuylkill, a branch of the Nile, south of Berber, in the Sudan, and it is now insisted that the United States firm had the specifications in advance of its rivals.

Mr. Highy of Highy & Westwood, a leading English firm, has published an interview yesterday says: "I simply do not believe that any firm in the United States firm had the specifications in advance of its rivals."

"Of course, a bridge has undoubtedly been shipped from Philadelphia, but I absolutely decline to believe that work on it was commenced on February 28. The United States firm either had the specifications before or adapted a standard bridge to suit the requirements of the case. No other explanation is possible. The general feeling is that the British firms have been unjustly treated."

PORTER'S RESEARCHES.

Advocates Use of Cane in Preference to Beet Sugar.

London, April 4.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says: "Mr. Porter, before leaving, told a few of the results of his latest researches. German beet sugar, he finds, cannot be manufactured under two conditions, the same as that of cane sugar in Cuba."

"If the grocers of England and the United States could be induced to promote the sale of cane sugar in preference to beet, the consumption and production of the former would rise considerably; and this would contribute more to the solution of the bounty question than prolonged negotiations."

Mr. Porter thinks also that if the British Government withdrew the Indian bounty, that would be a further reason for the United States to change its attitude toward the bounty on cane sugar, more especially as the question about the existence of the most favored nation clause between the United States and Germany is complicated.

"These various reasons, together with the increasing production of cane sugar in Cuba will force the sugar-producing countries to deal with the unbearable bounty question."

Paris, April 4.—The regular service of airmail cables, for which the public has been looking for a month, began yesterday.

There are expected to be Charles ratings after Easter. Thirty thousand Spanish reserves have been called out.

It is understood that the Government intends recalling about two-thirds of the military contingent from the Yukon. There are 25 officers and men, and all but 75 who will be left at Dawson, will be recalled.
