#### QUEEN'S STATUE

Toronto, June 14.-The first sod for the foundation of the Queen Victoria statue was turned at 10 o'clock yesterday by the Hon. Richard Harcourt, acting Premier, in the presence of a somewhat small audience. The site selected for the statue is at the east front of the parliamen't buildings near the encircling sidewalk, and here at the hour appointed, 9.30 a, m., a large number of interested citizens had assembled. Mr. Harcourt, was however, late in arriving, having been delayed at the Union station, where he had gone to bid good-bye to Premier Ross, who was leaving for England, and as the moments slipped by the spectators scattered, and comparatively few witnessed the simple cere-mony. The acting Premier took the spade in hand like a master, drove into the earth, and deftly raised and turned the sod and thus commenced the work of preparing the spot on which is to stand the statue of the late Queen. There were no speeches The statue, which is now on the way across the Atlantic, it is expected, will be in position in about six weeks.

#### FAMINE IN SIBERIA

St. Petersburg, June 13.-The famire n Siberia is spreading with increasing rapidity. Reports from Irkutsk show that an enormous number of faminestricken people are flocking to that city. They are camped in the open, without shelter of any kind, are clad n rags, and are dependent entirely on private charity, which is quite indaequate to cope with the distress.

The latest crop reports from western, northern and central Russia show the conditions in those parts of the empire to be flourishing. Reports from Orel, Kieff, Kazan and the provinces in the northwest are satisfactory. On hand, the conditions are very bad in the transcaspian territories, owing to drought, and locusts, which will necessitate Government relief and re-sowing to the amount of \$250,000. Cattle plague also prevails in the stricken districts.
