ENTERTAINMENT A LA MODE

Saturday-to-Monday House Party Now the Correct Thing.

The Saturday-to-Monday house party is now the correct thing among out-of-town hostesses, and surely no jollier form of entertainment than this has yet been devised.

Whether simple or elaborate preparations are made dependent, of course upon the size of the establishment and the number of servants, but, whatever else it may or may not be, the house party should be distinctly informal. The note of invitation for a Saturday-to-Monday party should be explicit as to trains, etc., and should also state whether guests will be met at trains by conveyances; arrived at the house, afternoon tea is served, English fashion, and then, if the gathering is a large one, the ladies retire to their rooms and do not return until five minutes before the dinner hour. Again, English fashion, dinner is the only ceremonial meal, but even there dress is comparatively simple, the women wearing pretty demi-toilettes and the men dinner jackets instead of the regulation dress coats.

At many out-of-town houses Sunday morning "breakfast parties" are much affected, the house party being supplemented by outsiders, who arrive on wheels, afoot, or horseback, as inclination dictates. These meetings are, of course, delightfully informal, and the breakfast served is really what the French call a déjeuner a fourchette—that is to say, a judicious compromise between the morning meal and the midday luncheon. Grape fruit, it goes without saying is the first choice; a golden or silver follows next, then the piece de resistance—a bird or broiled chicken—with potatoes done in some delicate style; waffles then, or hot cakes, and last of all, delicious strawberries, served with rich country cream.

Many hostesses, who rejoice in a large country house, where the hall is the special architectural feature, have breakfast served at small tables set in the hall, the hall itself lavishly decorated a la rose tree; that is to say, with trailing vines on walls, and mantel, and doors, and the effect is charming. What to wear at such a gathering is, of course, the question that arises first in the feminine mind when an invitation is received for a Saturday-to-Monday party. The answer to that problem is easy. In compliment to your hostess, put your prettiest and dresdest gown in a dress suit case, add to its contents a duck skirt, a crisp shirt waist, and the small toilette accessories, and even the most fastidious woman is suitably equipped for such a stay. A neat tail or gown is worn on the train, or if one travels a wheel, then the dress suit case is sent ahead and the bicycle costume is made as chic and trim as possible.

What Girls are Doing. Another thing the girls are doing is making small hair pillows to send to the men. These were suggested to them by an old regular army officer who has seen much service, and who told them that a man could make himself quite comfortable anywhere in the open with his blanket if he only had a hair pillow to lay his head on. These pillows are not stuffed very full, so that they may be easily rolled up in the blankets. They are about twenty-seven inches square and are covered first with ticking, and then with a slip cover of denim or cretonne, which can be taken off and washed. Some of the girls are embroidering dark blue ones in red initials and monograms, brown ones in yellow or blue, and so on, in different combinations of color.

There is a certain set of well known society girls in town who are buying luxuries and packing cases of them for the men they know in the different camps. Each girl has pledged herself to give so much money every week, and a committee on packing and shipping the cases has been formed, which will attend to the sending of them off every two weeks until the war is over. The goods are all to be sent to one of the girls' houses, which will be kept open all summer if the family goes away, and any donations of sensible and practical articles of food will be gratefully received—Harper's Bazar.

How to Climb Stairs. A physician who declares that very few people know how to walk upstairs properly gives these instructions: "Usually a person will tread on the ball of his foot in taking each step. This is very tiresome and wearing on the muscles, as it throws the entire suspended weight of the body on the muscles of the legs and feet. You should, in walking or climbing stairs, seek for the most equal distribution of the body's weight possible. In walking upstairs your feet should be placed squarely down on the step, heel and all, and then the work should be performed slowly and deliberately. In this way there is no strain upon any muscle, but each one is doing its duty in a natural manner. The man who goes upstairs with a springy gait may be sure is no philosopher, or, at least, his reasoning has not been directed to that subject. The doctor might have gone a little further in the same line and protested against the habit which many persons have of bending over half double when they ascend a flight of stairs. In exertion of this kind, when the heart is naturally excited to more rapid action, it is desirable that the lungs should have full play. CANNON BALL

Condensed as War Weapons. They Are Just the Thing in Stone Quarries.

"Cannon balls for blasting!"

This sign, hung in a conspicuous place before the door of a store on Atlantic av., led a reporter inside and started a bit of questioning upon the subject.

The proprietor said: "Last fall when the United States Government sold all of the old cannon balls and solid shot which for so many years were piled in pyramids along the main street of the navy yard at Charleston, we purchased a lot of them, with little thought of converting them into anything beside pig iron. But a few weeks after we had stored them here I overheard a quarry owner complaining of the slowness and uncertainty of the old system of steel wedges used in getting out huge blocks of granite, and after a bit of thought I suggested the use of cannon balls in the places of steel wedges. We sent about twenty of various sizes and weights out to his quarry, and after the first trial he hurried a team in here with a note that read: 'Tried the cannon balls; they are it. Send fifty more; have thrown the steel wedges away.'"

"The experience of this man led us to send the cannon balls and solid shot to other quarry operators, and within the past month the orders have been coming in so thickly we can scarcely fill them from the stock on hand."

"The method used in getting out great cubes or monoliths from granite and marble quarries has been to drive steel wedges along the line of the lower portion of the split made by a blast until the great chunk of stone topples over on its face."

"It required a deal of time and number of men with his iron sledges and steel wedges to separate these cubes from the quarry wall from which they had been started by the blast."

"The method now pursued with the cannon balls is to start the block of stone away by a light blast, and then between the quarry face and the block several of the smaller solid shot, usually the 4-inch sort, are dropped down into the aperture. Two men with crowbars give the block a shove, and the instant the block moves the slightest manner forward the shot takes up their 'purchase' on the space made, when the large cannon balls, some measuring fourteen or fifteen inches and weighing 200 or 300 pounds, are dropped into the top of the gap. Now, the slightest outward jar by levers on the big stone send these heavy cannon balls dropping downward or their own weight, until with an easy forward motion, the cube goes over on its face."

"These shots do away with any driving of necessity their great weight in proportion to their size forces them downward, and their form prevents any chance of backward setting of the block."

"These cannon balls are also used as rollers, as they take up and go over the inequalities of the quarry surface, and can be rolled in any direction without resetting, thus doing away with the old style wooden rollers."
