KILLED MAN

Two Women Were Defending Them selves Against his Assault-Both Arrested

Pittsburg, Aug. 21.-Robert Nogler, Hebrew peddler, was killed to-day while attacking two women in the home of Osborne Woods, at No. 12 Camp street. Mrs, Arriel Lees and Mrs. Grace Woods, who were defending themselves against the man's assault, are under arrest, the former on a charge of murder, the latter being held as a witness.

For a week past Nogler has been seen trying to enter the Wood house several tymes late at night. This afternoon, it is alleged, he burst into the room where Mrs. Woods and her little son were and made an assault on the woman. Mrs .Lees, who lives next door, rushed in and interposed. The man turned his attention to her and after following her from one room to another, seized a bread knife, it is alleged, to carry out his threats of mur-der. The women fought frantically in

a narrow stairway. Nogler was stab-bed and staggered to a chair, while the blood gushed from his neck. He died before medical assistance arrived. Mrs.Lees rushed from the house and ran a quarter of a mile to the office of Dr. John G. Burke for assistance. While the doctor was going to the scene of the killing the woman went to her home, hastily changed her clothes and went down town to meet her husband, R. C. Lees, a telegraph operator, who was to go with her to Atlantic City to-night. She was ar-

rested shortly afterward. Mrs. Lees made no statement to the police. She and her husband came here from Georgia about a year ago.

TANK COLLAPSED

and one Hundred Persons Were Burn ed More or Less Severely.

Philadelphia, Aug, 22 .- By the colapse of a burning oil tank this afternoon, at the Atlantic Refining Company's plant at Point Breeze, where a fire has been raging since Monday afternoon, about 100 persons, firemen, employes of the company and spectators, were more or less severely burned. Most of the cases were treated on the ground by ambulance surgeons, but a few of them were considered sufficiently serious to necessitate the removal of the victims to the hospital.

Dykes were hastily thrown up by the firemen and employes of the company, and the blazing fluid was confined to an area of about two blocks on Passyunk avenue. At one time it was thought the flames would communicate with the purifying house of the United Gas Improvement Com-pany, which is separated from the oil works by a vacant lot. The burn-ing oil overflowed the dykes to the lot, and only the most determined efforts saved the Gas Company's pror-

Late to-night the firemen and officials of the company said the fire was under control. Only one tank is now burning, and unless the wind changes from the south-west the fire will burn itself out within a few President Lloyd, of the Atlantic Re-

BURNING OIL IN SEWER.

Philadelphia, Pa., August 21,-The Campany's works at Point Breeze is burning more fiercely to-day than at any time since the explosion occurred. Shortly before six o'clock this morning another tank exploded and the firemen have given up all hope of saving any of the property. The wind is blowing the flames in the direction of

the gasolene and naphthat tanks, and fears are entercained that the gasoline tank will explode.
