In giving his indoment Chief Justice Hagarty referred to the fact that Fauquier had been warned during the contest that some of his acts were illegal. He said that it was quite evident that a number of persons had come into the riding who had won an unenviable fame for corrupt acts in elections, and that as a matter of fact many corrupt acts were being done in sending non-electors into the unorganized districts to vote, and supply them with means for their journey and otherwise. On the whole, the Chief Justice was unable to see why the decision of the judges in the Court below should be reversed by giving Fauquier the benefit of the saving clause, and his disqualification should be allowed to stand. In this case the petitioners had merely scratched the surface of the mass of corruption when the case was closed by the judges declaring that enough had been proved to mass at and disquality the member. Had the petitioners been allowed to proceed, a state of affairs would have been revealed which would have startled Canada, prepared though the country is to discover almost any inquity on the part of the desperate men who, at Sir John Macdonald's bidding, undertook to defeat Mr. Mowat's Government.

Bradlaugh was thoroughly unprepared for such a crushing defeat, and is seeking consolation in preparing a long list of exceptions to the charge of Lord Chief Justice Coleridge on which to base an appeal. He acted as his own counsel during the trial, and has a formidable string of points, which he proposes to carry to the Court of Appeal. He is still full of fight, and apparently has an abundance of capital behind him, but the success of his appeal is highly improbable.

A resolution was unanimously passed in which the Aumy pledged themselves to refrain from beating drums near honses where there is sickness, or while passing churches and Sunday schools, and also refrain from parading the principal passing churches and Sunday schools, and also refrain from parading the principal streets on Saturday nights, and asking the Council to repeal the obnoxious law. An influential deputation was appointed to wait on the Council and represent the sentiment and wishes of the meeting, urging the immediate repeal of the by-law.
