PUOAWAH TRADE.—During the past season 684,500 feet of doan were exported, valued at \$46,104. Total exports from here \$58,108—smaller than for many years past. One 700 ton vessel building.

SHIPPING ITEMS.—A letter from Cape Parly, on the "Arctik," at Bayone, France, states that a small struck her when leaving the harbor on 24th ult., driving her against a pier. SMALL POX has broken out in an hotel at Georgetown, P. E. I., and grave apprehensions of its spreading are felt.

ST. JAMES.—The new Lower Cove, St. John Church was consecrated by the Bishop on Sunday. Its cost was about \$11,000.
