## BANK RATE DOWN.

### Financial Affairs Look Rosy-Lots of Gold in Sight.

London, Jan. 23.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England was to-day reduced from 5 to 4 per cent. The reduction of the bank rate was a foregone conclusion, owing to the rapidly mproving financial conditions prevailing everywhere, which caused the market everywhere, which caused the market for discount rates to fall to 376 per cent. The return of each from the country considerably swelled—the reserve, which will be increased in the near future by the receipt of gold from Egypt and Australia, as well as bar gold en route to London. This will include five million dollars worth of gold, which probably will be secured by the Bank of England on Monday.
