**IMPROVEMENTS AT THE POST OFFICE**

During the past week the work of installing a stamp selling wicket at the Newcastle Post Office in addition to the General Delivery, has been in progress and is now completed. The new wicket, takes the place of the door which formerly opened in to the Postmaster's office and is a great improvement over the old way of selling stamps at the general delivery window, and prevents much unnecessary crowding around mail times.

Another improvement, which it is hoped will soon be installed by the Post Office Dept is the addition of another entrance, near the Henry St. corner of the building this enabling the public, when receiving their mail to pass through and out of the other door, instead of turning around and elbowing their way back to the place of entrance.

**NO LARGE BUNDLES OF PAPERS FOR ENGLAND**

Postmaster Troy has received the following letter re the mailing of large bundles of papers to the United Kingdom:

P. O. Inspector's Office  
St. John, N. B.  
Dec 28, 1917

To Postmasters:  
In a proclamation issued by the British Government the importation into the United Kingdom of "Daily, weekly and other periodical publications imported otherwise than in single copies through the post" has been prohibited.

This British restriction on periodical publications must be rigidly and uniformly enforced, and no publications whatever which do not comply therewith are to be forwarded to the United Kingdom.

You will therefore govern yourself accordingly.
