FIRST NON-STOP FLIGHT FROM BERLIN TO MOSCOW

OBITUARY

MR. JOHN INGRAM

The death of John Ingram occurred on Friday, July 28th, at his home in Little Shippegan. Deceased was 55 years of age and is survived by his wife (nee Hannah Fraser) two brothers and four sisters George of Duluth, William of Vancouver, Mrs. John Petrie of Maple Glen, Mrs. J. R. McKnight, of Chatham, Maud of Washington, D. C. and Mary of Newcastle.

The funeral was largely attended interment being in Little Shippegan. Rev. W. N. Byres officiated at the home and grave.

WAR VETERAN'S DEATH

Thomas Ginnish, Red Bank, Northumberland Co., an Indian with an overseas record, died Friday morning in the East St. John County Hospital from pulmonary tuberculosis. He enlisted in the 132nd Battalion at Newcastle in February, 1916, and reached France the following December. He served in the 87th Battalion until May 25, 1918, when he was invalided home and became an outpatient of River Glade Sanitarium. He was first admitted to East St. John in August, 1918, but was later well enough to go to his home. He was re-admitted and discharged several times, his last admission being on the 5th of June. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Ginnish. The D. S. C. R. made arrangements to have the body taken to Red Bank for interment.

JAMES A. HOUSTON

Boston, Mass.—James A. Houston, prominently identified with the retail dry goods business here for the past 65 years, died on Friday. He was a member of the old firm of Houston & Henderson, located on Washington street and Temple place, later known as the James A. Houston Co., doing a large jobbing business and dealing principally in silks and dry goods.

After selling out to Connell & Magrane, Mr. Houston intended to retire from active business but later backed his son, Ernest Houston, in a business in Temple Place. A life long friendship and business connection with the late R. H. White started when Mr. Houston, as a boy of 13, began working for Wilcox White Co. on Hanover street, which housed the first R. H. White store in 1857. At one time he managed a branch R. H. White store in Manchester.

When the White store was opened on its present location on Washington street in 1876, Mr. Houston assisted the architects with the building and was identified with the business as silk buyer, superintendent and general manager until 1893. In 1910 he returned to the R. H. White Co. and had been in charge of construction work ever since. He was 78 years old and was one of the last of the old school merchants here.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2.30 at his late home, 74 Maple street, Roxbury.

The late Mr. Houston is well and favorably known in Newcastle and his death will be heard with regret by many of his friends here. Mr. Houston was an ardent fisherman and for the past 35 years has been coming to the Miramichi on fishing trips up the Northwest Miramichi River.

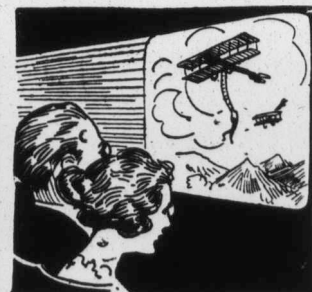
