BIG FLEET READY FOR TRIP TO SEA

Emergency Fleet Corporation Has
Many Vessels to go Through
Canals at Opening of Nav-
igation April 15.

Buffalo, March 19.—Canals between
Lake Erie and Montreal will be open-
ed between April 15 and 20, and dur-
ing the first month there will be a
big rush of downbound ships. All the
big lake shippers are busy turning out
steamers for the Emergency Fleet Cor-
poration and the orders booked call for
the delivery of more than 250 steamers
in 1919. According to the present lin-
up 100 steamers building for the govern-
ment for salt water service will be
ready to leave for the coast by the
opening of navigation.

The American Shipbuilding Co.
which has orders for 111 steamers will
have forty five completed and ready to
sail at the opening. The boats are be-
ing turned out at the Superior, South
Chicago, Detroit, Lorain, Cleveland
and Buffalo yards. The Great Lakes
Engineering works, which operate
plants at Ecorse and Ashtabula, tool
contracts for forty four steamers and
opening. The other boats will be turn-
ed out at the yards of the Toledo-
Shipbuilding Co., of Toledo; McDougall-
Duluth Shipbuilding Co. of Du-
luth, Saginaw Shipbuilding Co. of Sa-
ginaw, Globe Shipbuilding Co. of Du-
luth and Manitowoc Shipbuilding Co.
of Manitowoc. A number of tugs and
barges that are building at other yards
will leave for the coast at the open-
ing. The steel and concrete barges
which are being turned out at local
yards will be used in New York har-
bor.

The weather was very favorable all
winter for shipbuilding, but it will be
late in the season before all the ship
yards clean up on their contracts with
the Emergency Fleet corporation. The
wrecking steamer Favorite, which was
built at the local yard of the Great
Lakes Towing Co., will be the only
new boat to be added to the lake fleet
in 1919. She will replace the wrecked
boat of that name that was taken over by
the United States navy in 1917.

A number of the steamers building
for the Emergency Fleet corporation
will be oil burners. The question of
having a fueling station at Cleveland
was taken up by the government offi-
cials, but that plan was abandoned and
the oil burning steamers will take their
fuel at Toledo and Sarnia.

Buyer Steamer David W. Mills.
Capt. G. Peterson of Cleveland, who
arrived in Buffalo yesterday, announced
that he had purchased the wooden
steamer David W. Mills from the en-
drewriters and he will have extensive
repairs made on her hull.

PEACE BRIDGE SCHEME
The annual meeting of the associ-
ated boards of trade of Ontario is
to be held in Toronto on March 26th,
27th and 28th. The Port Erie board
will send Reeve Louis Douglass
and W. F. Willson to Toronto to
advise the associated boards on the
peace bridge scheme for Port
Erie. The Port Erie board has sent a
memorial to the board of trade con-
vention, which will be held, asking
for similar action.

\$9,000 FOR VIOLATING O.T.A.
The Bridgeburg police court, re-
sponding to the annual report covering
the year just completed by
Judge Menno House, collected in
lines for the twelve-month period ap-
proximately \$11,500. Of this amount
more than \$9,000 was collected in
fines for violation of the Ontario
temperance act. At the rate of busi-
ness at the court for the last seven
weeks, the coming fiscal year's
figures will show even larger receipts.

A satisfactory settlement has been
sached in Galt between the Board of
Yorks and their employees. The men
have agreed to a 55-hour week with
an increase of three cents an hour in
rates. The rate will now be from 28
cents to 29 cents per hour.

DEATH OF DR. SEATH
Former Headmaster of Local High
School Passes Away at
Toronto.

The death occurred late Monday
night of Dr. John Seath, Superintendent
of Education for Ontario, at his
residence, 364 Walmac Road Hill, Tor-
onto. Dr. Seath was in his 70th year.
Dr. Seath was born in Scotland in
1844 and was a graduate of Glasgow
University and Queen's College, Bel-
fast, holding degrees of B. A. and M.
A. from these universities, and LL.D.
of Queen's Kingston. He was head
master of Oshawa, Dundas and St.
Catharines High Schools before he be-
came inspector of High Schools and
collegiate institutes in 1884. In 1905 he
was appointed Superintendent of Edu-
cation for Ontario, and in the same
year he was made a member of the On-
tario Educational Advisory Council.
Three years later he undertook a mis-
sion to Germany, France and other
countries to report upon technical
schools.

**TO TEST ONTARIO
GROWN FLAX CROP**
As a means of ascertaining the re-
lative quality of Ontario flax fibre as
compared with that grown in Ireland,
Ontario growers decided recently to
ship a quantity of the domestic product
to Belfast, where it will be put through
the various stages of the process un-
til it is woven into cloth. A number
of the growers each furnished a bale
of flax, and the size of the total ship-
ment amounted to about ten tons.
Transportation to Ireland was arranged
for, and application was made for
Ireland to arrange for the sale of the
flax, and to make careful study of the
results at every stage, as compared
with the Irish flax. This will enable
data to be compiled which would be
available for the Canadian industry.

AT CUSTOMS CONVENTION

Customs Officers' Organizations of this

Ottawa last week.
