NOTICE.

Under and by virtue of "An Act re-
specting the General Hospital" (6
George V. Cap. XLIX), and with the
approval of the Governor-in-Council,
the Board of Governors of the St.
John's Hospital hereby give notice
that they have fixed and prescribed
the following scale of fees to be levied
from and paid by all persons who oc-
cupy beds or undergo treatment at
the Hospital. The scale is to come
into operation on the 1st day of Janu-
ary, 1921.

SCALE OF FEES.
Every person receiving treatment
in the General Hospital shall, after
December 31st next, pay fees accord-
ing to the following scale:
Persons admitted to the public
wards \$1.00 per day; persons occupy-
ing private rooms \$10.00 per week, in
addition to the daily fee of \$1.00.
Every applicant for admission to the
Hospital must bring with him or for-
ward to the Superintendent of the
Hospital certificate signed by a duly
registered physician that such appli-
cant is a proper subject for Hospital
treatment.

Under the provisions of the General
Hospital Act, 1915, all patients who are
unable to pay fees shall be required
to bring with them a certificate of
their inability to pay, which shall be
signed by the resident Relieving Of-
ficer, or where there is no such Of-
ficer, by a Justice of the Peace, or
Clergyman or other responsible per-
son. The fees of such patients there-
upon become payable by the Commis-
sioner of Public Charity by virtue of
the said Act.

NO DECISION.

MONTREAL, Oct. 21.
No decision was reached to-day in
the Conference called to discuss mat-
ters in dispute between the Coal Com-
panies of Nova Scotia and the miners
in that region.

WELLS ON RUSSIAN CONDITIONS.

LONDON, Oct. 21.
Conditions in Petrograd were sum-
marized in one phrase "hunger and
want, but order," by H. G. Wells, Brit-
ish author, when he arrived here last
night from Russia. He implied that
similar conditions prevail throughout
all Russia. He declared he had been
amused when he read of disturbances
and insurrections in Russia, adding,
"all that is just humbug."

GOVERNMENT WINS.

LONDON, Oct. 21.
Messages from Melbourne, Aus-
tralia, state that the elections give
Labor slight gains, but resulted in a
Government victory. Early to-day re-
turns from Victoria, on the local op-
tion poll, indicate that the vote will
go for a continuance of local option.

GERMANY GETS ORDER.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.
It is said the Russian Soviet Gov-
ernment is about to conclude a con-
tract with a German syndicate for six
hundred million gold marks worth of
locomotives. British prices are too
high.

LAST HONORS TO HEROIC SOLD- IER.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 22.
An immense crowd attended the
funeral of General Leman, Defender
of Liege. It was a magnificent and im-
pressive scene, with representatives
of the army and navy, and members
of the Government and diplomatic
corps.

REPRISALS CARRIED OUT.

CORK, Oct. 22.
Reprisals were carried out yesterday
at Newcestown, where military lorries
were recently ambushed with the loss
of two officers. Several houses were
burned after the families had been
driven out. Richard Sullivan was drag-
ged from his bed and questioned as to
the ambush, escaped with a bullet in
his neck.

RIOTERS DISPERSED.

BELFAST, Oct. 22.
Rival mobs, stoning each other on
Queen Street, Wednesday, were dis-
persed by military in armored cars.

MILITARY AMBUSHED.

CORK, Oct. 22.
A military party was ambushed yester-
day afternoon near Newcestown, and
four soldiers were wounded, two badly.

ITALIAN LAND DECREE.

ROME, Oct. 22.
A Royal Decree, allowing the occupa-
tion of uncultivated or insufficiently
cultivated lands by Peasants, and an-
nulling any lease of the same land
without the right to indemnity, except
for work, is in course of execution.

SUSPECT DISCHARGED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.
Harry C. Toback, arrested several
days ago on a charge of theft of Mad-
ame Caruso's jewels, worth half a mil-
lion, has been discharged.

morrow for here.

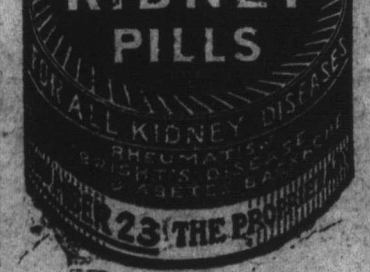
Schr. J. N. Rafuse, 6 days from

Civic Commission Weekly Meeting.

The weekly meeting of the Muni-
cipal Commissioners was held last
night, Chairman Gosling and Com-
missioners Ayre, Mullaly, Morris,
Peet and Vismcombe were present.

The minutes being confirmed the
following business was attended to:
A communication was received
from the relatives of the late Sec-
retary-Treasurer, Mr. Slattery, thank-
ing the Commissioners for the resolu-
tion of condolence forwarded them.

The Deputy Minister of Agriculture
& Mines wrote stating application
had been received for grant of land
Signal Hill, for stone quarrying pur-
poses and asked the Commission's
views thereon. Plan of property is to
be submitted.

Messrs. Harvey & Co., Ltd. wrote
regarding repairs to retaining walls as
there seems to be a difference of
opinion as to who is liable for up-
keep, the Company was willing to pay
half the cost of repairs.

The Engineer is to report as to the
likely cost of putting this wall in con-
dition. Before this matter was dis-
cussed, Chairman Gosling vacated the
chair and retired from the Council
Chamber, the chair was then taken
by Deputy Chairman Mullaly.

A communication was read from
T. J. Duley & Co. objecting to Cabs
being allowed to block entrance to
their shop, Water St. While the Com-
mission would like to remedy mat-
ters, they are not prepared to make
regulations at the present.

W. P. Pope's complaint re side-
walk George Street, was referred to
the Engineer.

Mr. Hugh G. Ford complained of
condition of South Side Road and
also requested better lighting in his
locality. The Commission are of op-
inion this locality is very well lighted
in comparison to other parts of the
city.

The Eastern Trust Company for-
warded a communication regarding
the opening up of Sandbury Street.
Commissioners terms ate to be sent the
Company.

Solicitor Carter reported regarding
breastwork West End. Also on the
matter of regulations governing lights
on Motors, Carts, Expresses, etc., and
stated the Commission had no power
to make such regulations.

Prop. Marshall's Garage asked that
arrangements be made to allow Motor
Sprinklers taking part in Mack Truck
demonstration, parade which takes
place Friday. Request was granted.

Messrs. J. Currie and Geo. Sum-
mers forwarded the names of the par-
ties to represent them at arbitration
of proposed expropriation of their prop-
erties by the Commission.

Permit to be given Rev. Dr. Kil-
chen to fence property around St.
Joseph's Hall. Engineer will give the
necessary street line.

J. R. Johnston's request to repair
house Bambrick Street could not be
accorded, as it is in the first limit.

J. Robinson, Cabot St. and Geo. Bud-
den, Field St. will be given permission,
subject to the Engineer's approval to
build extensions to dwellings.

Plans submitted by Hon. W. J. Ellis
to make alterations to premises Adel-
side St. were approved.

Messrs. Henry Birks & Sons, Mon-
teral forwarded communication re-
garding Tablets for War Trophies.

Tenders are to be called for deliv-
ery of Oats; also new slides for San-
itary Department.

up-to-date system in the different de-
partments of the City Service.

Report of the Sanitary Supt., City
Engineer, Plumbing Insp., etc., were
read.

With the passing of Pay Rolls and
Bills and the granting of requisitions
for the several departments, and the
disposal of routine matter, the meet-
ing adjourned at 11 o'clock.

Buccaneers.

A recent tale of piracy in port was
bravely reminiscent of the "bad old
days," when piracy on the high seas
was a common crime. In days of old
the bold buccaneer was in the habit
of boarding some peaceful merchant
ship at sea, and wrecking his will on
cargo and crew.

That was exactly what happened
on one of the Chan boats, in Glasgow
harbor a short time ago, only the
pirates, of whom there were alleged
to be two, came on board over a gang-
way. They boldly announced their
intentions of robbery, evidently with
the object of intimidating the crew,
but the modern merchant seaman was
not having anything of that sort and
showed fight. The sequel was enact-
ed before the Magistrate shortly after-
wards when one of the marauders re-
ceived a sentence of six months' im-
prisonment with hard labor, as an
example of any who might be similar-
ly minded.

Probably the coolest, most confi-
dent, and business-like method of
all was that practiced by the carter
who so completely hoodwinked the
authorities at the Liverpool Docks
some weeks ago. Forty-five crates of
New Zealand cheese, imported on be-
half of the British Government, were
stolen. The thief led a horse into the
Canada Dock, harnessed it to an
empty lorry standing near No. 1
shed, loaded the vehicle with the
crates, and drove off. No one inter-
fered, it being assumed that he was
employed by a contractor.

The empty wagon was recovered
the following day, but the stolen
cheese, valued at \$2,750, was con-
spicuous by its absence; so was the
carter; and despite the offer of a
\$100 reward by the police for infor-
mation concerning him, he hasn't
been seen since.

The Premier of France.

Recent political changes in France
have brought to the Premiership a
man who has rendered good service
for many years in various public
positions, but who is best known as
Minister of Marine in the Cabinet of
M. Clemenceau, the great war Cab-
inet that carried on during the war's
darkest days and saw victory crown
its labors. The Minister of Marine
was Georges Leygues, who became
Premier a few days ago.

The Marine Department in the
French Government corresponds to
the Admiralty in the British Govern-
ment. M. Leygues contributed notab-
ly to the success of the Allies in the
long struggle carried on to curb Ger-
man submarines. When M. Clemenceau
resigned the Premiership in Jan-
uary last, M. Leygues also retired
from the Ministry of Marine, but he
remained in the House of Deputies.

The way to his advance to the Prem-
iership was opened by M. Deschanel
retiring from the Presidency and M.
Millerand, then Premier, resigning
the latter office and being elected
President. The new President called
