The Long Pond Road.
Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Permit me a brief space in the page of your widely circulated and popular Journal, to place my note, requiring the attention of the authorities, who are responsible for the making, repairing and embellishing of our country roads. For a number of years past, I have been a summer resident of the Long Pond Road, my permanent abode is on William Street. A short while ago I conferred in conjunction with a number of residents of the Long Pond Road regarding the condition of that part of it, near or opposite the home of Mr. David Murrin, which forms a bend or curve by which the view of the road is lost sight of for some considerable distance, in the going or coming to the city, enforcing on times great inconvenience, and special care on the part of the drivers of automobiles, carriages, carts, etc., and much precaution to avoid accidents has to be adopted. Owing to this bend, the trees which overhang the curve intercept the view of the drivers of these vehicles, causing as I have said much carelessness to be exercised on their part. It has awakened the belief in my mind, and in the minds of the other residents, and of many citizens as well, who have cause to frequent that vicinity, that in it, lurks the danger of collisions. To help, to prevent such accidents, is what mooted the idea of my writing to your Journal, to inform and to ask the authorities interested, if it be possible to have the trees removed and the curve narrowed. If this were done, it would forestall and avert the chances of accidents taking place and it would furthermore impart a pleasing aspect to the road, and general surroundings. Of late years much intercourse between the city and that part of the country has taken place, vehicles of all sorts pass and repass day and night and as I have herein mentioned, large numbers of pedestrians as well, on business, or on pleasure bent, all of whom I am sure would be pleased if the road were widened, knowing as they do of the possibilities of accidents happening while it is left to remain as it is at present. Believing as I do that it is only necessary to impart this information to the proper authorities, to have the evil remedied, and thanking you for your kindness in permitting so much space in the columns of your Journal, I remain,

Keeping Memory Green.
AVENUE OF TREES FOURTEEN MILES LONG AS WAR MEMORIAL.
A scheme is on foot to plant avenues of trees in honour and memory of all Australian soldiers who made the supreme sacrifice in the various theatres of war in all the large cities of the Commonwealth. Ballarat has gone even further than this by planting the first trees of an avenue which will eventually be 14 miles in length, and which will consist of 3,912 trees—one in memory of each soldier who enlisted from the district. Each tree is to be enclosed by a substantial wooden guard with a board attached containing the name of a soldier. Those who were killed in action will have special commemorative boards. The trees are of 23 varieties, and have been chosen from the countries in which each particular soldier fought or fell.

Sounding the Deep.
The U.S. destroyer Stewart, equipped with the Sonic range finder, used for sounding at sea, has made a practical test trip from Newport to Gibraltar. The new method is closely related to radio, depending on the transmission of sound waves through water, and is employed to measure depths of the ocean. Soundings are made by measuring the length of time required for sound oscillations sent out from the ship to travel to the bottom of the ocean and back again. Dr. Harvey C. Hayes of the naval engineering technical staff, who aided in the development of the new naval equipment, is making the trip on the Steward.

Daily reports from the destroyer, during her trip across the Atlantic, indicate that the apparatus was a great success. Soundings were taken at regular intervals without stopping the ship, and indicated depths from 90 to 3500 fathoms. These soundings correspond to those taken by the old laborious method with the wire and lead, which required the stoppings of the ship for one or two hours during the operation.
