HOLM-"The working class nediately take over the of the state," said Swed Hialmar Branting, quo eds of Karl Marx after the arish Commune, in a recent address fore the Association of Sweden's oung Social-Democrats in Stockholm "We must not forget," continued the Premier, "that we have to go forward and upward and that it is a long way to go. The Socialist community which shall develop will not be exactly the one sketched out years ago, but it will conform to our basis ideals. The difficulties on our road have been infinitely greater than we could imagine." Mr. Branting pointed to examples in Central Europe and Russia, to show that the working clasess were not yet quite ready to perform the tasks which events had thrown before them. "During the last ten years," he said, "we have left the stage of being a proletariat without rights, and are now on a higher plane. Thanks to increasing education, it is clear that the working class is now overtaking, and in certain cases has outdistanced. the bourgeoisie as regards social and economic knowledge. We shall never allow ourselves to be fettered by private capitalism, and we shall see the fundamental principle of socialism win out. A thorough change will take place, but not through the power of decrees and order. First of all we must shape the human material out of which the new social edifice can

A BATTLE OF WITS.

DRESDEN .- Fresh instances of ingenuity are brought to light daily in the battle of wits which Germany's border officials are waging against smugglers. On the Bohemian line the authorities operated for a time on the principle that every German coat has, or should have, a German lining. They previously had lost much time in arguing with travellers as to whether or not the clothing in their possession at departure had been brought in with them, or was of material newly acquired in Germany. These discussions were obviated finally by stamping the linings of all articles of clothing at the time of entry into the country. Smugglers were not slow to vitiate this means of identification. They had double linings put into their old wearing apparel. After the top one had been stamped, it was used. for any new article of clothing later purchased in Germany. When the officials detected this circumvention of their scheme, the stamping was abandoned. Instead, expert German tailors are now engaged on the customs staffs to examine all clothing. and establish its place of origin.

## **Building Locomotives.**

MOSCOW - Russian locomotive works are operating so satisfactorily, it has been announced by the government, that hereafter it will not be necessary to purchase railway engines from foreign countries. To date the Soviets have received 680 locomotives from Germany, with 20 more to come. and 180 from Sweden, with 300 yet to be delivered.


